

Message from the Most Rev. Richard Gagnon, Archbishop of Winnipeg and President of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops to the 118th Annual Convention of the Knights of Columbus – Ontario State Council 1 May 2021

On behalf of the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops, I am pleased to write to you for the 118th Annual Convention of the Knights of Columbus Ontario State Council. Your gathering this year will be a virtual one that reflects the need to protect your members and their families from COVID-19. No doubt you will miss gathering in person, but I am sure that your virtual session will bear good fruit.

The past year has been unprecedented, especially when we consider the impact of the world-wide COVID-19 pandemic. Consequences such as loss of income, alienation from family, friends and coworkers, and the potential learning gaps that students are experiencing will have a lasting impact on our lives. Sadly, we have been helpless as we witnessed the illness and death of loved ones. Those who are most affected are the elderly, particularly those who reside in long-term care facilities. As COVID-19 took hold, it became abundantly clear that the elderly were not receiving proper care in many facilities. We have been horrified by revelations that care standards in these settings do not meet the regulations that govern them. We must become advocates for greater transparency to ensure that healthcare workers are well-educated and receive proper wages and that long-term care facilities are well equipped to provide quality care, especially in times of crisis, such as in a pandemic. Neglect and disregard for human life are not of God. The Knights of Columbus are known for putting its brothers and sisters' needs at the centre of its work. We encourage you to continue to work for the good of the most vulnerable among us.

As Catholics, we believe in the sacredness of human life from natural conception to natural death. The CCCB continues to respond to potential legislative changes that run counter to this vital principle. In particular, two issues under consideration by the Canadian Government have been in focus. Bill C-7: An Act to amend the Criminal Code (medical assistance in dying) and Bill C-6: An Act to Amend the Criminal Code (conversion therapy) both undermine, to different degrees, the inherent dignity of the human. If passed, these Bills will have a dramatic and negative effect on the lives of the disabled, those who are mentally ill, and those seeking assistance and guidance as they grow in their Christian understanding of human sexuality. We know that the Knights of Columbus promote human dignity through education and lobbying to ensure that such laws will not come into effect.

How wonderful that you have chosen 1 May 2021, the Feast of St. Joseph the Worker, to hold your conference. On 8 December 2020, Pope Francis announced a *Year of St. Joseph* to mark the 150th anniversary of the proclamation by Pope Pius IX of St. Joseph as the Patron of the

Universal Church. In the Apostolic Letter *Patris Corde*, Pope Francis identifies the extraordinary qualities of Saint Joseph as a beloved, tender and loving, obedient, accepting, creativelycourageous, working father hidden in the shadows. (cf. No 1-7 PC).

Indeed, on this Feast of St. Joseph the Worker, we are reminded that work is a right that must be available to all. Work is essential for human dignity. Work allows families to sustain themselves with food and shelter. Many among you are fathers and grandfathers who are deeply committed to the loving, gentle, but firm care of your children and your children's children. By your witness through prayer, action and work, you have shown them what it means to be a Christian husband and father. Your continued witness and your willingness to foster in others the vital role of fatherhood are gifts to the Church.

Pope Francis announced, on the Feast of the Holy Family on 27 December 2020, the Year of Amoris Laetitia Family, which will occur from 19 March 2021, the Feast of the Solemnity of St. Joseph, until June 2022 when the World Meeting of Families will take place in Rome. Throughout the year, we hope that there will be many opportunities to study the Apostolic Exhortation, Amoris Laetitia, as it sets out a vision for Christian love in the family.

Most recently, Pope Francis identified a World Day for Grandparents and the Elderly, which will take place on the fourth Sunday in July, close to the Feast of St. Joachim and St. Anne. Together, we will honour grandparents and the elderly who teach us so much about our faith. More and more grandparents are taking responsibility for the education in the faith of their grandchildren. Let us find ways to show our gratitude to those who have paved the way for their children to grow in faith.

And finally, as Church, we have all rejoiced abundantly in Father Michael McGivney's beatification on 31 October 2020. An inspiring and powerful example he was and continues to be for us all. In times of trial and confusion, strife and need, let us turn to this wonderful priest of the Church, now a Blessed, that his intercession will bring graces of healing to our families and society. May he accompany our efforts in continuing to build a culture of life and a civilization of love marked by the Gospel's call to holiness and service.

We are deeply appreciative of all of your excellent work for the Church, for society at large and the needy. May your Convention be a time of prayer, fraternity, and gratitude as you continue to serve the People of God in Ontario.



Despite the Pandemic this Fraternal year, Councils throughout Ontario delivered 8292 new quality winter coats for the children who were in need. We are very grateful to Brother Neil Bouvier for his tleadership in



undertaking this project. There were 2304 winter coats remaining from last year's order which Supreme generously purchased. We travelled with a van filled with food provided by Global Medic, and coats to Moosonee Diocese, Hearst in Northern Ontario. The Food was given to the Food Bank in Hearst, and some of the coats were distributed to the children at one of the First Nations Reserve at Constance Lake, with the support and help of Bishop Robert Bourgon. The balance of the Coats was shipped to various First Nations reserves. Coats where also donated to the various Children Aid Society Centres across Ontario.

Annual Charity Lottery

Our lottery which was postponed to a later month (October instead of June) has proven to be very successful. In total, 22% of the net revenue was refunded to the Councils for their Charities.

After a careful review of the State lottery, several changes were implemented by the board of directors to counteract the effects of the COVID 19 pandemic. As a result, our Annual Charity Lottery will now be a 50/50 online digital draw, which will be conducted every quarter. Tickets will have to be purchased online. All Council members, families and friends are invited to participate and support our many worthwhile charities. The 50/50 lottery is open to anyone residing in Ontario.

Martyrs' Shrine Project

The project of restoring the Papal Alter and new tower undertaken by the Ontario State Council and its Brother Knights began in earnest this past year. The groundwork included, demolishing the old tower, constructing the retaining wall, and laying down the foundation for the new Look-Out Tower. The ongoing work depends on the much-needed donations which will allow us to complete the refurbishment of the Papal Altar and the Tower. At this time, I would like to offer our sincerest gratitude to Brother Dennis Mailloux and his team for all the time and hard work expended in the completion of this project.



EXEMPLIFICATIONS

The new Exemplification of Charity, Unity and Fraternity has been very well received by all members of our Order world-wide. It could not have come at a better time than now, when we are able to easily conduct Exemplifications online, which last for about half an hour. We have already conducted several Exemplifications this year, and we encourage all members who have not yet been exemplified to please take advantage of this. Please take this opportunity to invite members to join. In honour of our Founder Michael McGivney's beatification, we have the privilege of availing the free online membership using the promotional code: MCGIVNEY 2020, which is available till the end of June 2021.

Growing our Order

Our Jurisdiction quota for Supreme this year to reach Circle of Honour is 9 New Council Developments (NCD) and an intake of 1925 members, which has now been reduced by 15%. So far, our efforts this fraternal year to recruit new members are 1268 which represent 77.75% of our percentage. We only require a further 530 candidates, and 5 New Councils to reach our goal before the end of June. Our goal is to attain the Pinnacle Award of our Order. This is the highest level of achievement awarded to a State Council by the Supreme Council and Ontario has never reached this exulted status in 120 years of existence. This year, we have the opportunity of achieving what has never been done and we can only do so with the help of all our Brother Knights, and their families. So, let us all put our shoulders to the task and push forward, so we can all share in this wonderful accomplishment at the end of this fiscal year. To reach our goal, we encourage each member to invite at least one person to join us, using the promotional code of MCGIVNEY 2020. As Christians. its our duty to invite all catholic men and their families to join our order. Bringing these men into the Knights will provide an

opportunity for them to revitalize their faith and beliefs, allowing them the opportunity to be welcomed in heaven. maintain its course every step of the way to achieve our planned goals. To continue this path of success, we must stay the course, employing the methods which allowed us to achieve our goals during my tenure. We must have the vision, and determination to utilise all the continuously changing technology and innovate virtual tools. If we embrace all these exciting new methods of communication, it will enhance and provide a better network, providing us a solid line of communications with all our member councils.

Presently, I would like to thank my wife Flavia, my two daughters Gabriella and Daniella for their strength and support through my journey on the State Board. More so, during these last two years as State Deputy. My family and I will never forget this journey. We will continue to remain faithful to this beautiful Order which stands for the Catholic values we all hold dear to our hearts.

The Beatification of Blessed Michael McGivney

The Beatification of the Founder

of the Knights of Columbus, Blessed Michael McGivney, on October 31, 2020, in the Cathedral of St. Joseph, Hartford, Connecticut is surely the most significant event of the year past for the Order, for all Knights and for their families. He is the third US-born priest to be so honoured, the first to spend his entire ministry in a US parish! Blessed Michael McGivney called his brother

Knights to live a life of charity, anticipating the call of the Second Vatican Council for the laity to transform society by the light of the Gospel. Knights do that by the witness of their many good works that benefit the Church, society, and the world! What a grace - to follow his blessed example!

The COVID-19 Pandemic Response

Perhaps the second-most significant experience of the year past was the COVID-19 pandemic and the restrictions and protocols that continue to affect our lives, those of our parish communities, and the lives of our State and local Knights of Columbus councils. "Unprecedented" is a word that has been overused. Of course it has happened before - Brother Knights will recall the H1N1 Swine Flu pandemic of 2009-2010, or the AIDS pandemic that continues to our time and has claimed over 35M lives! The Asian Flu frightened us in the 1950's and the Spanish Flu caused churches to be shut down in 1918-1920. My mother speaks often about the polio epidemic of her childhood: and we know that Blessed Michael McGivney died during a pandemic in his time. Unprecedented? No. Challenging for us all? Absolutely!

The severe restrictions have meant that citizens must "obediently" follow the rules for the safety and well-being of family, neighbours, and fellow citizens. Assembly of Catholic Bishops of Ontario established a SafeWorship subcommittee, which included an infectious disease medical professional, to recommend protocols intended to keep parishioners, who when authorized chose to attend church services, safe from "community spread" of the virus. For the most part, when the rules were followed, these stringent protocols succeeded.

"Obedience" is not a word that is widely appreciated in our time. The word comes from the Latin root - obedire, which means, to hear. More than to hear, it means TO DO what one hears. Knights, more than others, understand obedience, and we have striven to "follow the rules" to assure the safety of all!

Prayers for the Dead

Still, untold thousands (over 300,000 in Ontario) have contracted the virus and too many have died - most, tragically in Long Term Care centres. We remember them on every occasion. May they be welcomed to our heavenly home where there is "no more tears, no more suffering, only peace and joy in Jesus Christ, our Lord"!

The Year of St. Joseph

In the midst of the pandemic experience, and to mark the 150th anniversary of St. Joseph being declared patron of the universal church, Pope Francis proclaimed a yearlong celebration dedicated to the foster father of Jesus. In a December 8, 2020 apostolic letter, Patris Corde (With a Father's Heart), the Pope said Christians can discover in St. Joseph, who often goes unnoticed, "an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble." As Mary's husband and guardian of the Son of God, St. Joseph turned "his human vocation to domestic love into a superhuman oblation of himself, his heart and all his abilities, a love placed at the service of the Messiah who was growing to maturity in his home." Despite being troubled at first by Mary's pregnancy, St. Joseph was obedient to God's will "regardless of the hardship involved," the Pope added. As a carpenter who earned "an honest living to provide for his family," Christ's earthly guardian is also an example for both workers and those seeking employment, and the right to a life of dignity for themselves and their families. The year dedicated to St. Joseph will end on December 8, 2021. St. Joseph is a worthy

example for all Knights of Columbus who are husbands and fathers!

Year of "Amoris Laetitia" Family

On the Feast of the Holy Family, December 27, 2020, Pope Francis called for a special year to mark the fifth anniversary of his Apostolic Exhortation Amoris Laetitia (The Joy of Love). March 19, 2021, marked the anniversary of the letter which followed the synods on the family in 2014 and 2015. The year will be coordinated by the Dicastery for Laity, Family, and Life. "Let us entrust this journey, with families all over the world, to the Holy Family of Nazareth, in particular to St. Joseph, the devoted spouse and father," said Pope Francis. The Knights of Columbus have always offered strong support for initiatives that encourage family life. The Year of "Amoris Laetitia" Family began on March 19, 2021, and will conclude on June 26, 2022. Check out the Vatican website: www.amorislaetitia.va

I was elected as State Warden in 2006. As most of you know, my time on the State Board has not been without some twists and turns and major bumps along the way, but through faith and the example of our founder I was able to serve you.

As I promised when elected to the State Deputy position in 2017, I would travel around the Province during my 2017-2019 term to learn your Council's concerns, discuss solutions and celebrate with you Council anniversaries, milestones, and events. My wife Rita and I have thoroughly enjoyed meeting a great number of you personally from the far north to the southern tip of the Province. Your gracious hospitality and welcoming attitude will never be forgotten.

It was encouraging to hear members say, "Thank you for coming to visit us. No one from the State Board has ever visited our Council. Your visit makes us feel that we count".

During my two terms as State Deputy,

together with you, much was achieved:

- Instituted the new Faith in Action program throughout Ontario.
- Our Annual State Convention location was changed to beautiful Niagara Falls and although Covid has restricted our usage recently, our contract will resume when gatherings are feasible once again
- More dedicated trained State Recruiters were introduced to assist in obtaining new members
- The first ultrasound machine in Ontario under Supreme's Program was installed in Ontario
- A new Ontario Knights of Columbus website was introduced which continues to evolve
- Updated internal communication from State Office by introducing generic addresses
- The use of media such as Facebook, You-Tube and TV was beneficial to promote ourselves as Knights of Columbust
- · Race for Charity Marathons promoted the Knights of Columbus to the general public as well as being a means of raising Charity funds
- Knights on Bikes was adopted as an Ontario State Program to attract more members
- Our own Silver Rose can now travel throughout the Province any time during the year once the Program resumes
- · Ontario State Council Golf Tournament which was generally held in the GTA was held for the 1st time in Ottawa
- Coats for Kids 2018-19 increased

with the participation of more Ontario Councils sponsoring some 6876 good quality New winter coats for school age children

- Established a Disaster Relief Committee in Ontario when significant spring flooding occurred in 2019 and encouraged Councils to lend a hand in their areas. Supreme provided \$30,000 and supplies for those affected
- Better coverage on our overall Insurance Policy was negotiated with **Iones DesLauriers**
- Safe Environment Protocols mandated by Supreme were introduced to provide protection for our youth as well as protecting you against misconduct accusations
- · Annual March for Life saw more Councils sponsoring buses to attend the March in 2018 and 2019 - unfortunately when the pandemic hit events have been reduced
- The Columbia magazine editor agreed to provide more Canadian content if it was supplied by our members. The January 2019 edition featured an Ontario member with his family.
- Ontario participated in Supreme's new 'pilot' online eMembership program in 2018 which has resulted in Order-wide usage since that time. This method of reaching younger techy men to welcome as new members has proven to be

invaluable during 2018-2019 as well as throughout this pandemic.

I wish to express my gratitude to our wonderful State Office team for their commitment, dedication, and support; long time staff Liane and Anne, together with several new members whom I had the pleasure of welcoming aboard; Denis, Ani, Claudette and Jason (deceased). You were truly a valuable asset to me as well as the Knights in Ontario.

I would like to thank the support team at Supreme, Bishop Damphousse, my fellow Board Officers, and State Solicitor together with my Directors, TMW's, District Deputies, Grand Knights, and you, the membership, who were supportive and instrumental in achieving the prestigious 'Circle of Honour' Award in my final term 2018-2019.

I include "all of you" because Circle of Honour is not just for me, it is the Pride of Ontario!

In closing, I urge you to continue to Welcome men into the Order, and I thank you most sincerely for giving me the opportunity to serve you.

It is my pleasure to serve the members in Ontario as State Secretary for a second fraternal year. Below is a brief update on the portfolios that I am managing. Highlights of the past year include the virtual Supreme Convention in New Haven, our virtual DD meetings and board meetings, and the implementation of the "Leave No Neighbour Behind" program. Cost savings due to meeting and travel restrictions have allowed us to reduce the per capita being billed to councils by half this year.

Diocesan Associations

The Diocesan Associations and Zones have been meeting virtually since the start of the pandemic. One of their important functions is to elect delegates from Ontario to attend the annual Supreme Convention. The D.A.s and Zones that are eligible to elect delegates are determined by a rotation schedule. Since the last Supreme Convention was held virtually, and the delegates were unable to experience it, the State Board decided to freeze the rotation schedule by one year. This allows the same D.A.s and Zones that were eligible last year to elect delegates again this year. They were encouraged to elect the same delegate in the hopes that those delegates would be able to experience a full and in-person Supreme Convention in Denver this summer.

Arthritis Society

It is my pleasure to serve as the liaison between the Ontario Knights of Columbus

and the Ontario Arthritis Society, one of our principal charities. There have been many changes in the structure and leadership of the Arthritis Society over the past year. The Walk for Arthritis fundraiser has been discontinued. Also, the Ontario Advisory Board has been disbanded in favour of an Advocacy Volunteer group on which I am happy to serve. The Advocacy Volunteers are asked to contact our government representatives at all levels to communicate the key issues of concern for people with arthritis. The top three policy priorities being addressed are 1) wait times for joint replacement surgery, 2) access to medications, and 3) medical cannabis.

COVID-19

The pandemic has had a major, negative effect on the programs that our councils typically conduct. Although the "Leave No Neighbour Behind" program has given councils alternatives to help alleviate the effects of the pandemic, it is no substitute for the regular programs and social contact that has been greatly diminished. The current rollout of vaccines promises an end to the pandemic in the next few months, and we must be ready.

As we emerge from the pandemic, I expect a pent-up demand from our members to get back out into the community and get going again. Councils should start planning now for this eventuality so that there are programs in place and ready to go when restrictions are lifted.

I am looking forward to building a team at the State level to lead our councils out of the pandemic and bring them back to full operation so that we can continue our important charitable work for the Church, our communities, and our members.

Brothers,

It is my duty, for the second consecutive year, to report to you, the membership, on the financial transactions of your State Board as your State Treasurer. Before I begin, in this, my last year as State Treasurer, I wish to thank my other State Board officers for the assistance extended to me in carrying out the responsibilities to which I have been assigned.

In my capacity as State Treasurer, it is my duty to take charge of all State Council funds, to receive, to record to guard and disburse funds via the general account, charities account, and the trust account and the office account. As cheques come in, they are scrutinized for accuracy and assigned to the appropriate accounts along with the sub-headings to which they should be recorded. Scrutiny by State Board officers and an annual audit by a chartered accountant assure that these accounts are maintained in a current and accurate manner. It is also my duty to make sure surplus funds are invested so that the best return possible is realized. This is done with the advice of financial experts and the State Board officers.

The year-end statement for the period 01 July 2019 to 30 June 2020 appears on the following pages and gives an accurate account of the source of funds and how they were disbursed. The accuracy of these accounts is verified by Denis Paganelli, CPA, CA. I am confident you will agree that the financial activities of the Order in Ontario are quite wide and varied as it reflects that you, the delegates, have mandated the State Board.

One source of funds is the annual charities draw which we depend on to fund the many requests for financial assistance on the charity's foundation. Per capita revenue is the second source of funds used to finance the general work and expenses of the Order. Subordinate councils are billed on a per member basis, and it is based on the January 1, of each year, official printout from Supreme. Honorary Life and disabled members are deducted from this total. The result is a number used as the basis for billing each subordinate council. Despite the onset of the global COVID-19 pandemic in March 2020, I have been pleased by the response of most Columbian councils in paying their assessment in a timely fashion for the last Columbian year.

Before I pass along my portfolio to my successor, I wish to say a few words about the current billing. The State Board approved the fee reduction in good faith in the hope that this reduction will be reciprocated by a greater effort on the part of the subordinate councils and our members of the Order in Ontario to pay their per capita fees in the July 1, 2020 to 30 June 2021.

By cooperating in the collection of the reduced per capita fees, we will maintain some financial stability and secure our budgeting process so that we will not only survive this temporary obstruction in our activities but that we will emerge from it, ready to rekindle old acquaintances, renew our parish community activities and return to the work we do best as members of the Knights of Columbus.

Thank you, brother State Board officers, for your assistance and guidance during this past year and to you, the members of the Ontario jurisdiction, for your cooperation in helping me fulfil my duties in the position of State Treasurer. It is my sincere hope that you will show the same commitment and support to my successor.

Brother Knights,

Welcome to your 118th Ontario State convention. Although, it is a virtual convention again, I hope that it provides you a basic way to participate in the decisions that need to be made by all delegates from Ontario and hopefully without any hiccups in the technical aspect of this virtual convention.

My portfolios include:

Safe Environment:

Currently, as of early March, there are 122 councils (22.7%) that are fully compliant (4 officers) which leaves 414 councils that are not (77.3%). Forms continue to be our largest stumbling block to achieve compliance with 44 councils that haven't submitted their 185 form and 206 their 365 form. Failure to comply with Safe Environment will disqualify the council from many awards but this shouldn't be your only motivation toward compliance.

The leadership throughout the Order have an ethical obligation to accept their responsibilities and requirements to protect the youth and vulnerable persons in our communities and get themselves compliant with the safe practices set forth by the youth protection industry. Even if you do not want to believe, predators exist in communities large and small and we have an obligation to train ourselves on the methods to look for the signs and to continue as strong advocates for child safety. Would Jesus

expect you to do all you could, with all your might to protect His children and other vulnerable people?

Matthew chapter 18:6-7; Jesus speaks firmly and warns us about those who harm or have committed offences to His children. In summary, there is nothing more precious than our children hence nothing more important than to protect them!

I repeat myself with the next three sentences taken from my March State bulletin report because of their importance.

- "Grand Knights do not have the option to abstain from or opt-out of the Safe Environment program".
- "As proclaimed defenders of life in all stages, we should all vigorously embrace with all our willpower, without concern for the effort required, our Christian responsibility to protect our youth and vulnerable persons in society".
- "It is extremely important to keep copies of your current and all past liability insurance policies. Do not throw away any old insurance policies the council has purchased".

Financial Audits:

At the end of December, 255 councils (48%) still have 2 or more semi-annual audits missing which puts the FS and Treasurer at risk in the event of a monetary crisis (free \$5000 bonding has been removed). This should be worrisome and a concern for both the FS and Treasurer and it also creates a violation in the Charter, Constitution and Laws, Sec. 130. The council's Board of Trustees are solely responsible to complete these semi-annual audits and ensure their FS and Treasurer are bonded, Sec. 145. The FS and Treasurer must be bonded and is a requirement for these financial officers to handle money, Sec. 130.

We've all taken a pledge to protect all lawful and righteous things and to the Laws and Rules of the Charter and Constitution and that will always be the standard for me as a State Board officer. I thank all the delegates in the past for your support to elect me as your State Warden (2017-2019) then State Advocate (2019-2021) and I assure you, as I ask for your vote again this time as your State Treasurer, that I will remain unwavering in protecting the Laws and Rules of the Charter and Constitution and to the safeguard and care for the members in Ontario.

In conclusion and reflecting upon the pandemic situation that was thrust upon us, I hope that we emerge more appreciate of one other and with stronger relationships with all our fraternal brothers. Even though we couldn't meet in person, I hope that the extra time we had provided the executive officers the opportunity to make routine phone calls these past 12 months to their members. These actions should have bridged and mended any distanced relationships and eventually we emerge out of this pandemic with stronger, more vibrant, and more compassionate Christian relationships. I certainly miss the usual practice to give a friend a hug. It's amazing what we took for granted with our freedoms of the past. It is probably an appropriate time to review our Canadian Constitution Act 1867 to 1982 and our Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms and to become better acquainted with these documents.

We are in 1st place out of 13 jurisdictions in Division One at 1262 new members or 77% of our goal of 1636 new members and 17th out of 75 jurisdictions worldwide. With there being 3 months remaining in the fraternal year, this provides us with plenty of time to finish strong (as we typically do) and to accomplish our goals, with one of them being to achieve the Circle of Honour. With your support and leadership in your Territories, Districts and Councils we will collectively accomplish this goal.

Numbers aside, as Knights and Catholic

gentlemen, we have, as our Past Supreme Knight Carl Anderson has indicated on many occasions, "a moral obligation to ask every practical Catholic man to become a member of our great Order. There is no better way to render support to the Church than by recruiting men into our Order, and by keeping men and their families close to their faith." This is our Calling! This is our Mission! New Brother Knights provide the foundation for longevity for our Councils and manpower for the unmeasurable acts of charity we do, as well as for standing in large numbers in solidarity with our Bishops and Priests.

As we work towards successfully completing this fraternal year and accomplishing the

goals that we have set out as we embarked upon this journey, I would like to offer to you the following strategies from a membership perspective. In addition, you can also invite Former Members to consider rejoining the Knights, be it either through your Council or Online Membership.

Whenever possible make prospective members aware of the benefits offered by the Knights of Columbus such as RRSPs, RRIFs, Tax Free Savings Accounts, and our many insurance products, which include Long Term Care Insurance, Disability Insurance, Life Insurance and Annuities plus many more.

Ontario State Council has regularly scheduled online degrees, along with Exemplifications on Demand, offered by Supreme Council, allow for your prospective members not needing to wait for an extended period of time to take their degree. We have found that the Charity-Unity-Fraternity Degree has been well received by not only the new members, but also by our Brother Knights and their families.

Star Council is the goal of every active Knights of Columbus Council. Achievement of this milestone acknowledges the superior performance of a Council in several important areas including recruitment and Faith in Action programs. In order for your Council to be properly credited for its accomplishments, all of the required membership documents and forms need to be submitted in a timely manner to the

proper recipients or by using the Candidate Tab (Online Form 100) on Officers Online. Incentives have been put in place, by both the Supreme Council and the Ontario State Council, for those Councils that have attained the Star Council Award for this Columbian year ending June 30, 2021.

We have a number of other incentive and award programs that recognize the recruitment efforts of both Councils and Brother Knights, with one of them being the Ontario State Circle of Honour for Councils, Districts and Territories that have met their membership goals as set by both State and Supreme Councils. More information on these and other programs can be found in our monthly Ontario State Membership newsletters or on our Ontario State Membership website.

As we approach the end of this fraternal year, I am grateful for what each of you do, as it is simply not possible to grow our Order without your commitment to Father McGivney's vision in each of your Councils, parishes, and communities. We are still recruiting new members at a whirlwind pace through On-line Membership

and these newly recruited Knights are continually looking for opportunities to put their membership commitment into tangible action through the fruits of their chosen council's programs. If council programming does not exist at the grass-roots level, -then how can the expectations of these men possibly be fulfilled. I hope you are being made aware of the fact that these new initiatives do exist and that you are clearly being informed as to how to initiate undertakings that will result in obtaining tangible results through their implementation. In order to allow these programs to flourish, our membership at large must not only know that they exist, but as well they must know how to go about implementing them in a manner which creates the most optimal results.

There is absolutely no doubt that we can now provide wonderful opportunities to those that surround us whom we encounter on a regular basis to solidly affirm the fact that the Knights of Columbus is truly an organization whose members most definitely make a positive difference in enhancing the lives of others. RSVP (Refund Support Vocations Program)

This program encourages us to commit our support to our greatest virtue of our order to support, defend and stand foursquare in solidarity with our Holy Father, our Bishops, and all priests & clergy.

Some examples which have worked well are:

- Attend/support annual Ordinandi Dinner (virtual or in-person)
- Bottle drives/Returns for Vocations

Even during the pandemic - various RSVP programs can, and have been carried out successfully within many Councils, all while adhering to local health directives and ensuring the health and safety of all members.

Into the Breach

This program helps us deepen our Faith and commitment to God, His church and our

community. There are various programs to help us promote this program within our parishes like Bible study, which is one of the key programs to get all of us deeply involved, look into programs that are practical that will help sustain the needs of our Brothers and their families.

- Contact your Pastor for guidance.
- Promote and engage Council members and their families.
- Promote within the Parish Community
- Appoint a Chairman to lead the group.
- Ensure that the program is sustainable and encourage participation.

This year, we had one council conduct a virtual program which was highly successful. We need to encourage our Councils to adopt this program as it provides strength to deepen our faith.

Building the Domestic Church Kiosk

This program is specifically developed and promoted to encourage our Brothers and their families to encounter the depth of our Faith by using various small prayer books.

- Strengthen the domestic church through the distribution of high quality, engaging religious education literature.
- Consult with your parish pastor to establish the best possible location for the kiosk.
- Promote the availability of the literature within your council and

- within the community.
- Assist with distributing the literature at events.

This year we could not engage this program as we were in a lock down situation, however we must use virtual media tools to promote online resources which is available at kofc. org.

Holy Hour

This is a very engaging program for all of us to be part of as all of the Churches now have regular Holy Hour s at least on the First Friday of each Month, encourage our Brothers and Families to participate, we need to spend some time with our Lord in Silence and let him speak to us.

- Organize a regularly scheduled Holy Hour of eucharistic adoration.
- Encourage deep, personal encounters with God.
- Consult with your parish pastor for direction and guidance.
- Engage your council to generate ideas for prayer devotion and reflection, such as group rosary, prayers for particular intentions, etc.
- Build a council deeply rooted in faith.
- Promote Holy Hour within your council and within the parish community.

For the current fraternal year, we organized and carried out a highly successful Ontariowide Holy Hour and Spiritual Reflection event on March 13, 2021.

- Live stream of Holy Mass from St. Francis of Assisi Parish in Toronto
- Followed by Holy Hour.

We need to foster the need of spending more time with our Lord in the Blessed Sacrament as it helps us to build up confidence in our faith especially during these difficult times.

Marian Icon Prayer Program Our Lady Help of Persecuted Christians

This year the Program has been updated to the St. Michael the Archangel Icon.

Due to the pandemic, the distribution of the Icon has been postponed. Once we are provided with an update - we will share the same with the Council.

Sacramental Gifts

- Support families during the most important events in the life of the domestic church: the sacraments.
- Support is provided to families and the parish community through prayer and the presentation of symbolic gifts.
- The Knights of Columbus are always present to support and embrace parish families.
- Work with your pastor to determine how many gifts will be needed for candidates of the RCIA, First Holy Communion and Confirmandi.

Rosary Program

- This program encourages the ever-important devotion to Mary, patroness of our Order.
- Emphasizes the importance of prayer in the community and as a family.
- Rosary prayer services can, and should, be scheduled on any day of the week, and at any time of the year.

Rosary prayer can occur at your church, in the homes of Brother Knights and their families (where permitted by local health authorities), at outdoor garden areas, etc. Be creative - as this will interest greater participation and promote fraternity.

This year, our State Council has commenced

a Virtual First Saturday Rosary Devotion program every first Saturday of the month at 8:30 am, we need to be unified by praying together so that with our show of solidarity with Our Lady, we can continue to strengthen our faith to overcome all our tribulations and trials.

Spiritual Reflection Program

- Create annual opportunities for prayer and reflection together as a fraternity.
- Organize a retreat or a day of reflection - encourage your Council Chaplain to get involved and/or lead the group.
- Spiritual events are needed to rejuvenate Council members, and the greater community.
- Retreats/day of reflection can be organized for Brother Knights only, men only, or open to all.

Under the current circumstances, in-person Spiritual Reflection Programs are not possible, however - we successfully carried out two extraordinary online programs:

- Faith Theme Retreat: live stream of Holy Mass, recitation of the Rosary, presentation and reflection on FAITH by Fr. Conrad Fernandes followed by Q&A period, Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament, Chaplet of Divine Mercy and Benediction.
- Sermon on the Mount (Weekly Lenten Reflections): Weekly Lenten reflections on The Beatitudes delivered by two

Permanent Deacons (and fellow Brother Knights).

My Brothers, as we come to the end of our current Fraternal year, which has been emotionally and physically challenging, and stressful at times, many of our Councils were not in a position to get involved due to constraints in technology or other restrictions imposed upon us by the pandemic. However, we need to move forward and recognize that our needs are changing. Even our parishes had to move forward and engage in new technologies in order to keep us all spiritually nourished during periods where we weren't able to be together physically. We must move forward and continue to grow and strengthen our faith.

Brothers, I am sure that together, we can overcome this and look forward to a better new fraternal year.

Life Programs

It is my pleasure to have served the Knights of Columbus Ontario Council as the Life Director. During the COVID Pandemic many councils have found it difficult to participate

in the Life Programs and I hope that as the restrictions begin to lift that we can effectively work together to build a culture of life.

This year we had a few zoom meetings that

we made available to all councils to discuss participation in Life Programs. I think these zoom meetings were very successful, easy to do and free to organize. In other words, I expect to continue having zoom meetings in the future.

In 2020/21 we were challenged by Bill C-7, the bill that expanded Canada's (MAiD) euthanasia law. It is our role to express our opposition, as Canadian citizens, to intrinsically evil acts such as abortion and euthanasia. But the cultural battle continues.

The Knights of Columbus Faith in Action Programs recognize our role to stand up for truth, but also to change the culture through love.

We stand up for truth with our involvement in the National March for Life which will be on Thursday May 13. This year the March will be both virtual and live on parliament hill. The March for Life organizers don't expect many people to join the Parliament Hill live March for Life but they hope that many Knights of Columbus members join them as an honour guard.

Last year the virtual March for Life had much more participation than any previous March for Life on Parliament Hill. This is positive. Similar to last year, the March for Life will feature virtual events during the week of the March for Life. Pro-Life movies and presentations will be available online.

We ask you to sign up for March for Life updates at: marchforlife.ca.

We should be praying for the success of the March for Life.

This year our Supreme Knights, Patrick Kelly, has asked us to pray the Novena for Life for the nine days leading up to the March for Life (May 5 - 13). Supreme has designed a Canadian Novena for Life with daily prayer intentions that are being sent to every council in Canada.

We are urging every council to participate in the Novena for Life. Prayer changes hearts, prayer changes the world.

As stated earlier, we can change the culture through love. There are several programs that focus on loving one another, such as the Pregnancy Center Support program. There are many ways that councils can help Pregnancy Centers, but first we ask you to call your local Crisis Pregnancy Center and ask them what kind of help that they need. Maybe they need financial support, but maybe all they ask for is spiritual support. Do people in your parish know that the Crisis Pregnancy Center exists? Do they know what it does? Councils can be instrumental in creating awareness.

Helping a Crisis Pregnancy Center shows that we care about the pregnant woman and her baby.

Does your council call or visit your older members?

The **Seniors Program** is especially important now, as many of our Seniors have been denied social interaction during the COVID pandemic. In the same way, the Special Olympics program shows how we care for people with special needs.

I also want to thank the councils that participated in the Silver Rose Program this year. Many programs were difficult to organize based on the COVID restrictions, nonetheless, Brother Dennis Mailloux made sure that the Silver Rose Program continued.

In 2021/22 - I encourage our councils to become more involved with the Seniors and Widows Programs. As the COVID restrictions lift, we will realize that many of our seniors were negatively affected by the shut-down. We will have the opportunity to help reintegrate people into our parish community.



300,000 have been displaced because of the Beirut blast. Help Restore The Rosary Sisters Hospital.

The councils who contributed to this initiative are 10 councils and 2 assemblies. This initiative is a perfect example of how the Knights of Columbus get together and cooperate in charity and put their faith into action. When this blast happened in Beirut and affected its main Christian area, I decided to announce this initiative as a Knights of Columbus Christian Refugee and Disaster Relief project, probably the first one for the Beirut Blast in Ontario. The massive explosion on August 4, resulted in devastating destruction to the city and its port and the main Christian area. The Rosary Sisters Hospital was severely affected due to its immediate proximity to the Beirut port (less than 500 meters). The hospital suffered extensive structural and equipment damage and was no longer operational in all its medical and administrative units. Unfortunately, they lost a fellow nurse aid while several patients and members of the staff and patients were injured. The Rosary Sisters Hospital is a 200-bed hospital in the Gemmayze neighborhood of Beirut with up-to-date investigative equipment and operating rooms. The Rosary Sisters Hospital operates under the guidance of the Holy See in Rome, and its funding has always been dependent on donors and charitable organizations. Rebuilding this very vital healthcare institution in this very critical time, the hard situation of national economic crisis and hyperinflation, and covid-19 invasion, required also

the Knights of Columbus help and our charitable donations. The Hospital Director Nicolas Sister Akiki thanked the Ontario Knights for the donation that will be used for the repair of the HOSPITAL



EMERGENCY ROOM false ceiling. She said in French:

" Dear Knights of Columbus of Ontario, I come with these few words to thank you for your precious donation and your support during these difficult times. How delighted I was to see all these councils from Ontario, with these beautiful names of sacred Saints, coming together to help the Rosary Sisters Hospital in Lebanon. 

The nominal fee of C\$ 10 goes to the priest for supplies and to assist in his daily life. The project objective is to satisfy the spiritual needs of the faithful and the Knights of Columbus members in North America while helping the priest hood in the Holy Land. It is an approved practice by the Vatican.

The custom of offering a Mass intention is a part of the Catholic culture. When a priest celebrates Mass each day, he offers each celebration of the Eucharist for a particular person, or intention. By doing so he applies special graces from God upon that person or intention. Similar to how we are able to intercede for others by our personal prayers, the Church is able to intercede for us through the celebration of the Mass. However, since the Eucharist is the "source" and summit of the Christian life" the Mass possess a power that our personal prayers do not. The practice of offering Mass for particular intention is an ancient one, dating back to the early Church. Canon Law confirms this practice and states, "In accord with the approved practice of the Church, any priest celebrating or concelebrating is permitted to receive an offering to apply the Mass for a specific intention" (Can. 945 §1). The priest does not take the money for the Mass itself, but for the purpose of supplying the things necessary for Mass and for his own support.

The Mass Intention has immense power



and countless miracles and conversions have occurred throughout the centuries by offering Masses for a specific intention or person. Mass intention is a great treasure of the Church and has a spiritual weight that is incalculable. Offer a Mass Intention for the repose of the soul of a departed brother or relative or for any other intention. You will receive confirmation from the priest in the Holy Land. Over the past year we have been living under very difficult times, and we have not been able to live our normal lives or to conduct our council's business and programs. Despite that, we have been able to do everything in a different manner including the way we run our Ontario Knights of Columbus Convention.

I would like to congratulate our State Deputy, Brother David Peters and the State Board, Directors and Chairman for their extraordinary work during this difficult time, and as well with the trust in me to run one of the most meaningful and heart touching programs that I have ever been involved in.

The goals established for the last two years have been accomplished. We have sent three shipping containers to Costa Rica, --- two last year and one this year. We also sent 50 plus wheelchairs to the Middle East more specifically Iraq. We sent another 20 wheelchairs to Paraguay and we are sending a large container to Panama with 290 wheelchairs. We are also going to bring a container to Toronto for distribution making it an extraordinarily successful fraternal year, like never before in the history of Ontario K of C. This has been made possible due to the exceptional work and the major contribution made by several councils.

For more than ten years, I have had the honour, opportunity and the privilege to serve you as the Ontario Global Wheelchair Mission Chairman. I have to thank God for guiding me and giving me the wisdom to do the job to the best of my ability. It goes without saying that I have a passion for this pro-

gram. There has not been a better personal reward for me than to see the happy smiles of gratitude from the wheelchair recipients. Secondly, I also would like to express my gratitude to the State Deputies that have trusted me over the years with this portfolio, and I sincerely hope that I have met their expectations.

I have to thank all the councils in Ontario who over the years have made significant financial contributions to this worthy cause. Understanding the real need for many people to have a wheelchair that they otherwise could not afford. This has given them the opportunity of freedom, mobility, dignity and independence, not only for their personal wellbeing, but also for their families. It is an estimated that 100,000 people are currently in need of wheelchair.

We have made huge accomplishments over the years, since undertaking this portfolio. At the onset we came to realize that many Ontario councils were supporting the projects that the Canadian Wheelchair Foundation had established at the time. In fact, we found that Ontario councils were supporting other Organizations and other Knights of Columbus state drives. None of the programs were orchestrated as being an Ontario State driven project. We immediately got in touch with the Executive Director of the Canadian Wheelchair Foundation, Miss Christiana Flessner and went over the projects to determine their needs, and which Countries had requests for this service.

We started to promote the Ontario Knights of Columbus Global Wheelchair Mission, by sending a full container to Panama. We worked with the District Deputies to get their Councils to support this new Ontario State driven initiative. Our efforts were rewarded with 125 Wheelchairs in a container that we again shipped to Panama.



After the first wheelchair project was completed, the new project was San Juan de la Maguana in the Dominican Republic. The commitment of many councils made it also a successful project and we delivered a full container of wheelchairs.

Our next project was Costa Rica, and again with the support of many councils, and our efforts to explain the benefits of the program, we sent a container here as well. The appreciation of the people was overwhelming; however, the need was so huge that we did not have enough wheelchair for them. We made a commitment to return with another container, and once again the Ontario councils came through. Last year, we delivered 2 containers to San Jose, Costa Rica.

In this fraternal year we have three projects, -- Paraguay, Iraq and Panama. My brothers, I am so pleased to inform you that all the projects have been completed. This was



due to the support of Ontario councils, and there are not enough words to express my gratitude to all the donors that have supported the Global Wheelchair Mission. To you my Brother Knights, -- thank you.

I would like to take this opportunity to express my total appreciation and gratitude to all the State Deputies that over the years have put their faith and trust in me to run this portfolio. I sincerely hope that I have met their expectations and made them proud of what we have accomplished. Having said that, it is with a great deal of sadness that I announce that I will not be returning as the Ontario State Global Wheelchair Mission Chairman. I will be stepping down at the end of this fraternal year and after more than ten years, it is time for me to commit more time to my family.

To all my brothers, thank you, for all the support that you have given me over all the years. I am forever grateful. God bless you all. To the Canadian Wheelchair Foundation, who are an extraordinary partner, especially Christiana Flessener, the Executive Director and her staff, thank you very much for this amazing ten-year ride. We at the State office were faced with the same difficulties as our membership and their respective families. However, I have decided that these changes are necessary both from a personal wellbeing point of view and that of our order. Here is why GK12345@ontariokofc.ca and FS12345@ontariokofc.ca must be accepted and implemented by councils.

- 1. The request for change is mandated by your leadership.
- 2. Confidentiality which is of the utmost importance to Ontario State Council as it should be to you. Therefore, personal emails are not to be used for any KOFC correspondence.
- 3. SECURITY Personal emails are not to be used for KOFC correspondence as it leaves each one of you liable should there be and issue with confidentiality. In addition, the utilisation of the KOFC assigned email for all your KOFC correspondence ads a layer of security.
- 4. Historical data which is collected within this new GK12345@ontariokoc. ca or FS12345@ontariokofc.ca emails can be past on to your successor in the post.
- 5. When you sign-up for the email you get the following FREE applications. Microsoft Word, excel, power point, and a TEAMS platform.

6. What is TEAMS? Its like Zoom. This FREE Teams application can be utilized to communicate both by phone and with VIDEO (TV) with your council membership. It can be used for all types of meetings and presentations.

Therefore, the importance for councils to

call the State Office TO-DAY and sign-up for the Ontario State assigned EMAIL ACCOUNT. It will take about fives minutes of your time. You can use your cellphone, tablet, or PC to do it. You do not have any of the above gadgets. Then most likely your wife, son or friend will have one and I guarantee that if you ask them to help you to set up your email acct, they will do it. Once it

is done, don't just ignore the email. Please make regular daily visits to recoup the KOFC correspondence you will find there.

When you leave your executive position, PLEASE ask your replacement to contact us, so we can update our info and reset the email account, so he can benefit from its use and the historical data it contains.

My brothers, when you send any reports to the Supreme Council office, PLEASE send a copy of these reports to the State Office. Its critical we receive at least forms 185 - SO-185 and 365. In the last three years I can

personally attest that we only received on average 30% of the form 185's - council executives from our 540 Ontario councils. How are we expected to have updated information on council executives? There are councils for which we haven't received any up-to-date info for the past several years. As a result, we are unable to contact anyone from some of these councils. So please help us help you!!!

2020-21 Charities Fundraising: from paper Lottery to electronic Raffle

During the 2020-2021 fraternal year we have experienced a significant change in our Annual Charities Fundraising. We have evolved from the traditional paper-based Lottery to a 50/50 electronic Raffle.

\$676,000) did not do justice to the thousands of volunteer hours of the Knights and their families; at the end of the day there wasn't enough money to donate to charities.

Risks associated with the paper-based







There are many things that made the **pa**per-based Lottery memorable. Here are a few:

- High level of engagement of or Councils across Ontario. Last year we had 334 actively selling tickets, with average sales of \$2,041/council. This level of participation (about 60% of the total Councils in Ontario), speaks of the rooted tradition and popularity of this program. Many members/Councils would look forward to this annual event, to be at malls, at the back of the church and other places selling tickets.
- The net profit (sales expenses) was in the order of 15% - 17% of the total sales. The fixed costs were very high, namely \$500,000 for the prize board + \$40,000 for printing tickets/posters and mailing+ maintenance and transportation of the drum + hotel rental facilities, etc. The small profit margin in 2020 (about \$75,000 on sales of

lottery include lost tickets / books for which the Councils were responsible for and had to pay; colleting the books distributed to members was challenging and resulted in missed deadlines; mailing the stubs, unsold books, report and cheques cost Councils money, took time and caused stress. Staff at the Office had to spend considerable time to process about 176,000 tickets (verifying completeness and placing them in the drum), tracking tickets/Councils, etc.

The 2020 paper-based Lottery was very successful considering the COVID restrictions. When the stock market saw declines of 20% or higher; other fundraisers experienced declines of 15% or more, our paper-based Charities Lottery had only a 8% decline in sales compared to the previous year 2019. Collectively our Councils demonstrated resilience; several Councils sold more than in previous years, which compensated for others that sold less, due to COVID.

During the Summer 2020 and in the early Fall 2020 a committee comprised by State Board members, the Executive Secretary and led by Bro. Jaime Libaque, researched options about the future of the Charities fundraising and recommended the 50/50

electronic raffle for 2021. The State Board approved and the wheels were put in motion. The first communication of the 50/50 to all Councils was in November 2020.


The **50/50 electronic raffle** has several advantages compared to the paper-based lottery. Here are a few factors and early indicators of success:


Higher level of Council engagement. From the Pilot # 1, currently underway (until March 31) we have 39 Councils participating as vendor Councils, which translates to more than 70% engagement rate from the sample identified for the pilot.

- It takes less time for both the buyer and the vendor Council. Under the paper-based lottery imagine writing 100 tickets by hand with name, address, tel # and Council #. It may take 30 - 60 min and the hand writing may not be legible. By contrast, doing it on-line with the 50/50, it will take about 5 minutes and all the information of the buyer and selling Council will be clear and legible.
- Eliminates sending money, tickets, and report to the State Office by registered mail or dropping them in in-person by a deadline (usually one-month before the draw date). With the on-line 50/50. tickets can be bought until the last minute before the closing date and time. Councils can use an extra month of time to sell more tickets.
- Expected net sales profit in the range of 25% to 30%. This is primarily due to lower costs. We will know better about the profit margin after the first pilot is completed.
- We have contracted two professional reputable companies to work with us for 2021.
 - One is a Technology provider (Ascend), registered with the licensing body (AGCO) and provides software to manage the transactions and perform the draws using a computer Random Number Generator (no manual intervention). This company complies with strict protocols of protecting the privacy of buyers and the **security** of the business transactions.
 - ♦ The other is a Media Marketing company (Village Media), which owns and operates a network of 14 websites across Ontario.

- ♦ Both companies have solid experience for on-line fundraising for several organizations, including local hospitals, sports clubs, etc.
- Ability to know in real-time, market data of buyers and sellers, to understand trends and plan accordingly. This is possible thanks to the software provided by the Technology company, which allows tracking sales for each vendor Council and for the total. This information is used to update the selling page with the size of the jackpot.

As we close off 2020 and begin 2021 the above is not meant to be taken as a failure but rather an opportunity for better things to come. I believe 2020 forced us to become more innovative not only to navigate life differently but also to find new ways to adopt to change. If nothing else, I believe it has helped us to become much more compassionate towards each other.

New Council Development and Round Tables have been an integral part of not just the State Council but also the Supreme Council. Understandably we only opened three new councils in 2020 with several new councils in progress. For 2021 lets all attempt to live Blessed Fr. McGivney's dream of a Knights of Columbus Council in every Parish. How can you help?

You or your family may know of a parish priest or a parish in your area that does not yet have a council. It will be of great help if you could ask the parish priest if he would welcome a charter council in his parish. If the parish priest is open and receptive to your request, kindly contact the State Deputy, State Membership Director, or me. We will then meet with the parish priest and discuss how we can be instrumental in starting a new council in his parish. This is when we build a foundation though starting a new council may be challenging at times, this answers the question how will the new council survive in the first three years of their infancy? SUCCESSFUL GROWTH IS DEPENDENT ON A SOLID FOUNDATION.

What if the parish is unable to meet the requirement minimum of members? The following methods can be used in establishing a Parish Round Table.

- Parish round tables are ideal to provide a Knights of Columbus presence and be of service to smaller parishes and missions, and to recognize needs for ethnic development. In general, parishes with more than 150 families should first explore the possibility of forming its own council.
- The grand knight and his officers make lists of council members who belong to those area parishes. All will automatically become part of that parish round table. New parishioners of the parish may be recruited, as well.
- The grand knight, with the help of his officers and insurance agents, informs all council members who belong to the designated parish, that the Order would like to set up a parish round table and then explains the benefits to them.
- The grand knight and a Knight parishioner call on the pastor to offer help.
 - Since the pastor assigns the projects, there will be no conflict with existing groups.
 - o The grand knight presents the priest with a list of Knights who are parishioners.
- The grand knight appoints only one parish round table coordinator for each designated parish.
- The grand knight completes the Report of the Parish Round Table

Coordinator (Form #2629), mails it to the Department of Membership Development and sends copies to the State Deputy, District Deputy, State Round Table Chairman, and keeps a copy for council files.

- Formation of the parish round table and appointment of the coordinator are announced to those involved, and announcements are published in the parish and council bulletins.
- Once a round table grows and

exceeds 30 members and still has potential to grow, the paperwork should be submitted to form a new council.

In closing I wish to thank the State Deputy, State Membership Director, Fraternal Benefits Advisors, District Deputies, and everyone who were instrumental in getting the three new councils off the ground.

The pandemic's impact on our lives can't be understated. Social distancing and

government restrictions have forced councils to meet in the virtual sphere. Fundraising opportunities have been curtailed and parish recruitment drives have been shuttered. In the spring of 2020, the Ontario Coats for Kids program looked as though it might fall off a cliff. Even the schools weren't too sure

what to expect given that students in Ontario were learning virtually from home.

In the fall, things changed. Kids went back to school and for many, a return to something resembling *normal* life. Unfortunately, this return to normal also meant a reemergence of an old problem – the need for kids' winter coats. In some areas, the need for coats didn't just reappear as its usual self, it had grown.

By late September, requests for coats started coming in. At first, the response from the councils was slow. Not surprisingly, several councils said that they simply didn't have the funds this year. Things did not look promising as supply was being handily outpaced by demand.

But then things began to change...

The donations started coming Councils in. responded, like they always do. The insurance agencies responded, as they always do. Supreme responded, like they always do. The State Board responded, as they always do. And the personal and corporate donations started coming in like never before. The

gap between supply and demand began to shrink, and an increasing number of coats found their way to children in need.

As a result of our combined efforts. the Ontario Knights of Columbus Coats for Kids program reached a new milestone in 2020: **8256** coats donated.

Dear Mr. Peters: March 25th 2021

Thank you for taking an interest in the Redemptorists Mission Stamp Burse. The Stamp Burse was formed by Father William Wyllie C.Ss.R. in 1934 to help the Redemptorist Missionaries in Japan. There followed other missions in India and many other developing countries.

To this day, stamps are donated, processed and sold to (philatelists) Stamp Collector Companies and the monies raised by those sales are matched by the Redemptorist who donate the funds to Canadian Food for Children.

Canadian Food for Children, (a Registered Charity) was founded by Dr. Andrew Simone, MD, FRCPC. Encouraged by St. Mother Teresa the first two trucks were on their way to Halifax to be distributed to developing countries in 1981. Today, about 18 countries receive shipments. All the items collected and non-perishable food still continues to be donated and shipped.

The donated warehouse in Mississauga is a hive of action; sorting and loading and shipping. The monies donated by many volunteers, organizations, manufactures and the Redemptorist Mission Stamp Burse help pay for the expenses.

My involvement started in 2012 through a suggestion to create a Recycle & Reuse Program to weave Sleeping Mats out of milk bags, collect eyeglasses, pop tabs, fabric and of course the used postage stamps. (I assumed the position of Eastern Ontario Volunteer Coordinator for the Redemptorist Mission Stamp Burse in November 2017.)

Although Covid-19 is impeding our volume it has not stopped our contacts and volunteers, however it's now time to reach out to more organizations and people to support these wonderful charities. So, my request is asking for your support in helping us become more visible in our province through your organization.



Qualified Opinion

I have audited the accompanying consolidated financial statements of Knights of Columbus Ontario State Council, which comprise the consolidated statement of financial position as at June 30, 2020 and consolidated statements of operations, cash flows and changes in net assets for the year then ended, and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies.

In my opinion, except for the effect of adjustments, if any, which I might have determined to be necessary had I been able to satisfy myself concerning the items referred to in the next paragraph, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Knights of Columbus Ontario State Council as at June 30, 2020, and its financial performance and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations.

Basis for Qualified Opinion

In common with many charitable organizations, Knights of Columbus Ontario State Council through The Knights of Columbus Ontario Charity Foundation derives revenue from donations and fundraising activities the completeness of which is not susceptible to satisfactory audit verification. Accordingly, my verification of revenue from donations and fundraising activities was limited to the amounts recorded in the records of the organization and I was not able to determine whether any adjustments might be necessary to revenue from donation and fundraising revenue, net expense for the year, assets and net assets.

I conducted my audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards. My responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of my report. I am independent of the Organization in accordance with the ethical requirements that are relevant to my audit of the financial statements in Canada, and I have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with these requirements. I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

Responsibilities of Management and Those Charged with Governance for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations, and for such internal control as management determines is necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is responsible for assessing the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern, disclosing, as applicable, matters related to going concern and using the going concern basis of accounting unless management either intends to liquidate the Organization or to cease operations, or has no realistic alternative but to do so.

Those charged with governance are responsible for overseeing the Organization's financial reporting process,

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

My objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes my opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with Canadian generally accepted auditing standards, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit. I also:

- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks, and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion. forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the Organization's internal control.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of accounting estimates and related disclosures made by management.
- Conclude on the appropriateness of management's use of the going concern basis of accounting and. based on the audit evidence obtained, whether a material uncertainty exists related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the Organization's ability to continue as a going concern. However, future events or conditions may cause the Organization to cease to continue as a going concern.
- Evaluate the overall presentation, structure and content of the financial statements, including the disclosures, and whether the financial statements represent the underlying transactions and events in a manner that achieves fair presentation.

1. Purpose of the organization

The Knights of Columbus Ontario State Council (State Council) was formed in 1903 as the Provincial Executive for the Knights of Columbus Councils in Ontario. The main principles of the Knights of Columbus are charity, unity, fraternity and patriotism. Program involvement is in the following areas: church, family life, religious vocations, charitable fundraising, pro-life, education, community services and youth activities. The Ontario State Council is an unincorporated not-for-profit organization and is exempt from income tax.

2. Significant accounting policies

Principles of consolidation (a)

The consolidated financial statements of Knights of Columbus Ontario State Council include the accounts of Ontario Knights of Columbus Corporation, incorporated under the laws of Ontario as a corporation without share capital, and the accounts of The Knights of Columbus Ontario Charity Foundation, a registered charity incorporated under the laws of Ontario as a corporation without share capital.

Basis of presentation

These financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting standards for notfor-profit organizations in Part III of the CPA Canada Handbook, using the restricted fund method of reporting revenues. The General Fund, which consists of the non-consolidated activities of Knights of Columbus Ontario State Council accounts for the Council's operating activities. The Charity Funds, which consists of the activities of The Knights of Columbus Ontario Charity Foundation accounts for the Council's charitable activities. Charity funds are restricted to charitable purposes and are subject to the disbursement requirements for registered charities as provided in the Income Tax Act, Canada. Ontario Knights of Columbus Corporation is inactive and has no assets and liabilities.

The State Council's funds consist of the following:

Reserve Account

This fund is internally restricted by the Board for special purposes if required.

Ontario State Chaplains Bursary Fund

This fund is established by resolution of the Board to provide a Provincial Bursary Program, to assist Knights and members of their families pursuing a post secondary education, who meet appropriate guidelines as established by the Board and is funded by external donations.

Christopher Fund

This fund is established by Supreme Council of the Knights of Columbus in a program under which a special per capita levy, together with a matching amount from Supreme Council, is being contributed to Knights of Columbus Canada Charities, Inc. and accumulated in the Christopher Fund, the income from which is to be used for charitable purposes. The Knights of Columbus Ontario Charity Foundation has been appointed to administer the Ontario participation in the Christopher Fund.

Disaster Fund

This fund is established to receive external donations to assist where a disaster has occurred.

2. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Memorial Catholic Education Fund

This fund is established to receive external in-memoriam donations to be used to support The Knights of Columbus Ontario Charity Foundation's bursary program.

Coats for Kids Program

This program is established to receive external donations to supply kids with winter coats.

Canadian Military Scholarship Fund

This fund is to be disbursed to the Canadian Military Ordinariate to be used to support Military Seminarians.

Martyrs' Shrine Altar Renovation Fund

This fund was established with the desire to and ideas for the updating, repairing or rebuilding the tower and papal altar at the Martyrs' shrine in Midland, Ontario.

Raffle Fund

The Raffle Fund accounts for the activities of the Foundation's annual raffle. The next proceeds must be used for the purposes approved by the licence granted by the Alcohol and Gaming Commission of Ontario.

Revenue recognition (c)

Contributions

The State Council follows the restricted fund method of accounting for contributions. Contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.

Per capita assessments

Per capita assessments are set annually by the Board of Directors for the calendar year and are recognized as revenue proportionately over the fiscal year in which they relate if the amount can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured. Accordingly, one half of the per capita assessments billed in fiscal 2020 have been deferred to the next fiscal year.

Raffle proceeds

Raffle proceeds are recognized as revenue in the fiscal year that the raffle is held.

Sale of roses and magnets

These items are recognized as revenue at the time of shipment.

Investment income

Investment income comprises interest from cash, interest from fixed-income investments, interest from money market funds, realized gains and losses on the sale of investments and increases and decreases in the fair value of investments. Revenue is recognized on an accrual basis.

2. Significant accounting policies (continued)

Revenue recognition (continued)

Other

State bulletin assessments are recognized as revenue when billed.

Supreme refunds and state convention revenue are recognized as revenue in the fiscal period in which the activity occurred.

Other charitable activities such as the Coats for Kids program and golf tournaments are recognized as revenue in the fiscal period that the events occur.

Capital assets and amortization

Capital assets are stated at cost less accumulated amortization. Leasehold improvements are amortized over the term of the lease. Website costs are amortized on a straight-line basis over 5 years. Amortization for other assets is provided using the declining balance method at the following annual rates:

Office furniture and equipment Computer equipment

20% 30%

(e) Inventory

Inventory is valued at the lower of cost and net realizable value, with cost being determined using the first-in first-out cost method. Net realizable value is the estimated selling price in the ordinary course of business less any applicable selling costs. Inventory consists of finished goods that are purchased.

Financial Instruments measurement

The State Council initially measures its financial assets and liabilities at fair value. It subsequently measures all its financial assets and liabilities at amortized cost, except for investments which are measured at fair value. Changes in fair value are recognized in the statement of operations.

Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash, accounts receivable and Funds held by Knights of Columbus Canada Charities Inc.

Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include accounts payable and accrued liabilities.

Financial assets measured at fair value include investments.

Investments consist of Canadian fixed income securities with maturity dates both within the next fiscal year and greater than the next fiscal year. They are all reported as long-term because the Board has no intent on cashing the investments over the next fiscal year.

6. Funds Held by Knights of Columbus Canada Charities Inc.

At June 30, 2020, the Knights of Columbus Canada Charities, Inc. is holding \$748,638 of contributions and reinvested income contributed to it from the Foundation. Knights of Columbus Canada Charities, Inc. is also holding an additional \$284,940 which represents the matching contributions from Supreme Council that is not property of the Foundation but on which income is being earned by the Foundation. During the year the Foundation earned \$30,589 (2019 - \$29,891) on these funds.

The income earned from this investment is income for the Christopher Fund which has been designated for the support of the charitable works of the Foundation and is being paid to the Foundation for that purpose.

7. Contingent liability

The State Council (its Foundation) is contingently liable under an outstanding letter of credit in the amount of \$502,500 issued by its bank as a performance guarantee in connection with the raffle to be held on October 30, 2020.

8. Commitment

The Knights of Columbus Charity Foundation has extended its leased office space for a three-year period expiring on July 31, 2021 with an option to extend the lease for a further two-year period. The minimum gross rental payments required over the next 5 years are:

9. Deferred Raffle Proceeds

11. Financial instruments

The State Council is exposed to various risks through its financial instruments. The following analysis presents the State Council's exposure to significant risks at the reporting date, i.e. June 30, 2020.

Interest rate risk

The organization is exposed to interest rate risk as the fair value of its financial instruments will fluctuate due to changes in market interest rates on its Canadian fixed income securities. The organization considers that its Canadian fixed income securities are sufficiently liquid to minimize any interest rate risk on its investments.

Credit risk

The organization is exposed to credit risk resulting from the possibility that parties default on their financial obligations. The carrying value of the organization's main financial assets represents the maximum credit risk to which the company is exposed.

The organization's credit risk is due mainly to its accounts receivable and investments. The credit risk on its investments is minimized by holding only high-grade investments and diversifying its portfolio of investments.

Liquidity risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the organization will not be able to meet a demand for cash or fund its obligations as they come due.

The organization considers that it has sufficient liquidity in its investments to ensure that funds are available to meet current and long-term financial needs, at a reasonable cost.

Market risk

Market risk is the risk that the fair value of future cash flows of a financial instrument will fluctuate because of changes in market prices. Market risk is composed of currency risk, interest rate risk and other price risk.

The organization is exposed to market risk on its investments and Funds held by Knights of Columbus Canada Charities Inc.

DAVID PETERS, State Deputy

Your Excellency, Worthy Supreme Warden, Worthy Regional Growth Director, Worthy Supreme Director, Worthy past Supreme Directors, Worthy Past State Deputies, Fellow State board officers and Worthy Delegates. Welcome to the annual meeting of the Ontario State Council. I'll now call this meeting to order. As we open this virtual meeting, I would like to ask our State Chaplain, His Excellency Bishop Marcel Damphousse to open with a prayer.

The minutes of the 2019 State Convention and all reports of Committees, of Officers, Resolutions and Budget for the next Fraternal year have been distributed prior to this meeting and posted on the State Council website for review. I ask that everyone, especially delegates stay connected until we have concluded the meeting. It is now my pleasure to introduce our Supreme Knight Carl Anderson for his remarks.

CARL ANDERSON, Worthy Supreme Knight

My brother knights, it is a pleasure to speak to you in these challenging times. I applaud you for holding your convention via teleconference. The Coronavirus pandemic has changed our daily lives, but it will not change our commitment to fraternity. This is not the first pandemic the Knights of Columbus has faced in the late 19th century and again in 1918. We remain strong and active as sickness spreads. What was true then is true now. Why? Because we have remained true to the principles of the Order. I have said before that where there is a need, there is a light. This is a time of great need and once again, we must stand together to meet it. We have the financial strength to address the suffering we see around us but more important, we have the Fraternal strength to do the great works of charity that defines the man. As leaders of your jurisdiction, you have the responsibility to mobilize our efforts. Thank you for what you have already done. It is impressive. Your Councils and your brother Knights continue to look to you for leadership. Continue to show them, the Knights of Columbus way to put to Faith into Action.

In March we launched a new initiative – Leave no Neighbour Behind. The response to this pandemic. We called on all Knights to support our brothers, support our parishes, to support our community, to feed the hungry, to participate in blood drives. This is when your Councils are the missionaries of the Order wide effort to Leave no Neighbour behind. I would ask you to begin with the brothers in your Council. Make contact with every one of your members. Do they need a helping hand in some way during this pandemic? During this time no Brother Knights should feel forgotten or left behind by the Brothers of his Council and you should have the same approach for the members of our parishes and our neighbourhoods.

As part of Holy Week, we announced a multi million-dollar campaign to support food banks in the United States and Canada. We are providing urgent support for the hardest hit communities and the neediest among us. Our initial commitment of \$1,250,000 is only the first phase of this campaign. Many Councils and individuals have contributed to our effort. This important work will continue in the days ahead.

In addition to our charity, we are also standing strong for unity. With our church experiencing serious financial strength the Order has established a \$100 million church loan fund for Dioceses in the United States and Canada. It will offer a Diocese a \$1,000,000 line of credit which will help them weather the serious economic impact through the crisis. In Rome, the Order is making it possible for the Vatican and Bambino Gesu hospital to create a dedicated treatment area for infants inflicted with the Coronavirus. We are proud to sponsor the Pope's Holy Week broadcasts including his historic "urbi et orbi" blessing of the city of Rome and of the world in response to the pandemic. Pope Francis has called on all Christians to unite their voices to heaven and I urge every Family to pray a prayer for protection in time of pandemic. As the crisis continues, the need for charity and unity will continue to grow. The same is true for fraternity. With all in person Knight of Columbus meetings and events cancelled for the foreseeable future, we are finding new ways to bring our brother Knights together.

This convention is a sign of what's possible and the Supreme Council will continue to provide guidance and support. We have expanded our monthly nightline email with a new weekly edition and each email contains practical and spiritual resources for our brother Knights and their families. Our Insurance Agents and customer service team will also remain available to help members with any insurance or related financial needs they may have. Otherwise, our determination to overcome them

is greater still and as we move through this pandemic together, the Knights of Columbus will be there. We will Leave No Neighbour Behind. We will forge forth ahead together as brother Knights. I believe our response to this crisis will rank among the Order's finest hour.

This fraternal year, the Knights of Columbus reached 2 million members, an historic milestone. I thank all the brother Knights who made this possible. The day I was elected your Supreme Knight I said we had a moral obligation to offer the benefits of membership to the Knights of Columbus to every eligible Catholic man. Fr. McGivney's gift to us of this wonderful organization was never intended as a gift for only a few. It was always meant to be shared. Now nearly 20 years later I believe this more strongly than ever before. The more men who join, the more lives we will transform in the communities we will serve. The more men we have, the more we will do for our parish and the more Catholic families we will strengthen. Now our key component of our efforts going forward will be our new Exemplifications ceremonies. We've already received an overwhelmingly positive response and where it should. It teaches our lessons of Charity, Unity and Fraternity in a way that is compelling and grounded in the rich history of the Order. We'll make it easy to bring men into our way. For those men to serve in Council Offices. This new ceremony provides a gateway to inspire the next generation of Knights and strengthen Councils across the globe. Now it is available in a virtual format when in person ceremonials are not possible. Men join the Knights of Columbus for the benefits of belonging to our great Catholic brotherhood.

The principles of charity, unity change lives for the better every day and every day we fulfill Fr. McGivney's strength of offering Catholic families financial protection they can depend upon through our commitment to Insurance by brother Knights for brother Knights. Our impressive growth is simple, the spiritual genius of Fr. McGivney, we have found a way to transform friends into brothers, brothers who are committed to one another. Today Knights of Columbus offers Catholic men a path of Christian discipleship a path marked by the guideposts of Charity, Unity and Fraternity. It is a path we walk, not just one day a week but 24/7. You can be proud that the business aspects of the Order have consistently been rated superior and that we successfully complete are inspired but because of our commitment to Catholic principles. Last year our agencies did almost \$90 billion in new insurance. We continue to have more than a \$100 billion of insurance in force protecting the financial future of our Catholic family. As leaders of your jurisdiction remember that you General Field agents can be your best partner in working to grow the Order.

And we should all remember that our insurance program and our charitable work arise from the same source. Our responsibility is to provide for our families and for those that need. Last year brother Knights donated more than \$185 million to charity and volunteered more than 76 million hours. We fed the hungry, sheltered the homeless, donated more than 8,500 wheelchairs and put coats on the backs of more than 117,000 children. I am proud that earlier in this fraternal year brother Knights from Mexico and the United States came together to provide food, water and clothing to displaced families along the border and especially to women and children. These are in keeping with our long history of defending the downtrodden and the marginalized.

To continue our efforts to reach out in our community, and when it comes to defending the right to life, the Knights of Columbus continues to lead the way. Just over 10 years age we've launched a new initiative with the goal of placing 1000 ultrasound machine in crisis pregnancy centres. We've now not only met that goal but exceeded it and to date we've placed more than 1,200 ultrasound machines in those centres and if each ultrasound reduces the number of abortions by just one a per week for each machine, then we will have saved more than 60,000 children in this coming year. Think of that. 60,000 children saved. And as I've said before, this is the greatest humanitarian achievement in the history of the Knights of Columbus. There is so much more for us to do. We must continue to rescue the unborn. Until that time when their lives are once again protected by law.

In all that we do, receive the charity to evangelize. The Lord has called us to be his witnesses. And especially to be his witnesses in our home and in our parishes. This is why, several years ago we launched the Building the Domestic Church program and why we started our Faith in Action initiative. These programs deserve the attention of every Council and so does our powerful video series Into the Breach. Today I ask that every Council promote these programs during this pandemic when Catholics are spending more time then ever at home. Our programs to build up Church and the home are needed more than ever.

Our history is one in which we are proud. Today, nearly every jurisdiction composed nearly 100 years of fraternity and charity. This year marks another milestone in the history of the order' 100 years of charitable service in Rome to the successor of Peter. Recently, Supreme Officers and Supreme Directors travelled to the Eternal City where Pope Francis received us in a private audience. This pilgrimage commemorated the 1st Knights of Columbus audience since Pope Benedict XV in 1920. In his message to us, Pope Francis has praised our faithful witness in defence of lives for support of particularly Christians and all our charitable efforts. He also thanked us and now I quote him "for our unwavering devotion to the successor of Peter". I would ask you to pay particular attention to these words of hope of Pope Francis. He said "in our hope ... by the division and pandemic laws, the generous commitment of your Order to serve all in need, especially to young people is an important inspiration to the global nation of indifference and that we can work together to bring about a just and inclusive society. I also believe that every Bishop in your jurisdiction can say the same about your work. My brother Knights, the Knights of Columbus is needed today more than ever before. Not only to confront and overcome the Coronavirus pandemic but to protect our church and ensure a future of faith for our children and our grandchildren. My sincere hope is that through amidst all these challenges that we grow closer to one another that leads us to live more profoundly our principles of Charity Unity and Fraternity. And that we will live more.... Pope Francis has said ... hope that God has given us. May the Venerable Fr McGivney and Our Lady of Guadalupe Pray for us all.

Thank your very much worth State Deputy David Peters. It is an honour to be with my brother Knights of Ontario. Dear Brother Knights, I would like to share with you a little message I have prepared this coming week for the Catholic Education Week here in Ontario. As you might guess many of our students and teachers and their families are really struggling because of this Pandemic and the one virtue that is really tested is the virtue of hope, and so this particular week, the theme is about Igniting Hope and maybe for us as Knights of Columbus we are so fortunate to realize how we are called to be beacons of hope.

I have also appointed Brother Ronald Van de Steen, State Solicitor to serve today as Parliamentarian for this virtual meeting. At this time, I call on Brother Marcel Lemmen, State Secretary for the report of the Credentials Committee.

MARCEL LEMMEN, State Secretary

In reviewing the list of delegates, we find the information provided by our Councils and cross checking this with the members that have joined us today for this virtual meeting, our State Treasurer and I have the following number of delegates; 6 State Officers, 1 Immediate Past State Deputy, 365 Delegates, for 372 total voting delegates.

DAVID PETERS, State Deputy

Without objection the role of delegates submitted by the Credentials Committee will be the official role of voting members at the Convention. Without objection the rules will be suspended, and the following shortened order of business will be adopted. Prayer, appointment of committee on credentials, report of committee on credentials, approval of 2019 minutes, records of committees, records of state officers, nomination and election of state officers, nomination and election of representatives and alternate to the Supreme Council, consideration of resolutions, new business, prayer and adjournment.

At this time, we will proceed with the approval of the minutes of the 2019 State Convention which has been distributed prior to the convention. Are there any corrections to the minutes? There being no corrections to the minutes, the minutes are approved.

At this time, we will proceed with reports of committees. As the various reports of the Committees have been distributed prior to the State convention without objection they will be accepted as written and included in the minutes.

Let us move on to the reports of Officers. As the various reports of the State Officers have been distributed prior to the State convention without objection they will be accepted as written and included in the minutes.

I will now ask our State Secretary if there is an update to the report of the Credentials Committee.

MARCEL LEMMEN, State Secretary

Since the initial report of the Credentials Committee we have had one delegate join us. The new count is: 6 State Officers, 1 Immediate Past State Deputy, 366 Delegates, for 373 total voting delegates.

DAVID PETERS, State Deputy

Thank you, worthy State Secretary. Without objection, the revised role of delegates submitted by the Credentials Committee will be the official role of voting members of the convention. We will now proceed to the election of Officers. Please note that nominations submitted for State Secretary will be considered as seconded nominations made to the floor for consideration of that respective position. It is important that voting delegates follow the instructions on how to vote. The voting will be anonymous. The system that we are using records the votes but does not show how any particular delegate voted. Remember that only credential delegates, past State Deputies and current District Deputies have rights to the floor, and you must be recognized to speak. If someone with the right wishes to do so to speak please hit *3 on your phone and you will be placed in the queue. Even though we are using an electronic voting system for the vote, in case of an unseen issue I have appointed Brother Nat Gallo, Past State Deputy as the judge and Brother Arthur Peters, Past State Deputy and Brother Brendan, Saunders Former Vice Supreme Master as tellers.

For the purpose of election of State Deputy for the next fraternal, year I am turning the gavel over to **Brother Bruce Poulin, State Treasurer.**

BRUCE POULIN, State Treasurer

Thank you, Worthy State Deputy. Good morning brothers. We will now go through the voting procedures in English and then repeat the same procedures in French before we actually carry out the vote. So please bear with me as we go through the instructions and do not vote until we ask you to do so after we have finished explaining the format. This will be the same format for all the elections during this convention so please pay attention.

English version of the instructions. At this time, we will proceed to the balloting for the position of State Deputy. Balloting will be open for 2 minutes. During this time, you will either press 1 on your phone for **David Peters** or press 2 on your phone for **Harold Marcotte**. Wait until you hear that your vote has been registered. Please note that if you feel you have selected the wrong number during the 2-minute voting period you may vote again, and the application will record your most recent vote.

Brothers, now that I have explained the format in both official languages, I now ask you to please vote now. Brothers, the 2 minutes are past, and the balloting has been completed and the tally confirmed. I now call upon the State Secretary for the results.

Since there were no other nominations, without objection the State Secretary will cast 1 ballot for Marcel Lemmen as State Secretary for 1-year term commencing July 1, 2020.

For the purpose of the election of State Treasurer for the next fraternal year, as noted in the guidelines distributed and posted on our State Council website the following nominations were submitted for the position of State Treasurer. **Bruce Poulin** and **Theodore Majkot**. At this time, we will proceed to the balloting for the position of State Treasurer. Balloting will be open for 2 minutes. Press 1 for Bruce Poulin or press 2 for Theodore Majkot. The balloting has been completed and the tally confirmed. I now call upon the State Secretary for the results.

> WHEREAS: The State coordinator for the Supreme Convention held in Toronto in 2016 has agreed to help us again and mark our 125th-year anniversary in 2025;

> THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: The State Board shall signify its interest and submit a bid package requesting to host the Supreme Convention in the jurisdiction of Ontario in 2025 to the Supreme Office; and

RESOLUTION 10 - Opposition to the Supporting Children, Youth and Families Act, 2017 Revisions to Child Protection **Proceedings**

SUBMITTED BY: San Damiano Council No. 15861

> WHEREAS: The Supreme Court of Canada has held, in regard to section 7 of the Charter, that it should be "plain that the right to nurture a child, to care for its development, and to make decisions for it in fundamental matters... are part of the liberty interest of a parent"; and

WHEREAS: The Court further stated that "the common law has long recognized that parents are in the best position to take care of their children and make all the decisions necessary to ensure their well-being"; and

WHEREAS: The Court further held "the parental interest in bringing up, nurturing and caring for a child, including medical care and moral upbringing, is an individual interest of fundamental importance to our society." (ref. B. (R.) v. Children's Aid Society of Metropolitan Toronto, [1995] 1 SCR 315); and

WHEREAS: The Universal Declaration of Human Rights provides that the family is the natural and fundamental group unit of society and is entitled to protection by society and the State (Article 16(3)), and that Parents have a prior right to choose the kind of education that shall be given to their children (Article 26(3)); and

WHEREAS: The International Covenant on Civil and Political Rights, to which Canada is a signatory, reiterates the above provisions in part, and further states: "The State Parties to the present Covenant undertake to have respect for the liberty of parents and, when applicable, legal guardians to ensure the religious and moral education of their children in conformity with their own convictions" (emphasis added), in Article 18(4), which was further confirmed as applicable in Canada by our Supreme Court (Loyola High School v. Quebec (Attorney General), 2015 SCC 12); and

WHEREAS: The government of Ontario has passed the Supporting Children, Youth and Families Act, 2017 (hereinafter "SCYF"); and

WHEREAS: SCYF provides that, in determining what is in the best interests of children, government agencies and courts must consider the "gender identity" and "gender expression" of the children, and includes provisions whereby the government is authorized to remove children from families which do not accept the gender ideology promoted by SCYF; and

WHEREAS: SCYF replaces the previously enunciated right of a parent to direct a child's religious education, with the newly engaged power to direct the child's upbringing in accordance with the child's "creed," which effectively serves to give the government grounds to intrude upon Catholic or other religious parents from raising their children in accordance with their faith; and

WHEREAS: The Knights of Columbus is a Catholic fraternal organization, which affirms both that God created us male and female and that everyone should be treated compassionately, according to their human dignity, as created in the image and likeness of God, and that parents as first educators should direct the religious instruction of their children; and

WHEREAS: In Amoris Laetitia Pope Francis decried the "ideology of gender" imposed through "educational programs and legislative enactments," teaching that instead, the young "need to be helped to accept their own body as it was created"; and

WHEREAS: The Catechism of the Catholic Church (2211) teaches that the political community is obliged to protect parents' rights to bring up their children in keeping with their moral and religious convictions.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the Ontario State affirms its opposition to the Supporting Children, Youth and Families Act; 2017, insofar as it empowers government agencies to make decisions about children's custody, health, and moral decisions in place of parental rights based on a gender ideology incompatible with Catholic teachings, and allows a child's "creed" to trump parental rights; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That Catholic School Boards be informed of the opposition of the Ontario Knights of Columbus to any acceptance of gender ideology incompatible with the Church's teachings in their respective codes of conduct as they apply to employment rights, as part of denominational guarantees owed to public Catholic education under s. 93 of the Constitution Act, 1867, s. 29 of the Charter of Rights and Freedoms, the provisions of the Education Act, ands. 19 of the Ontario Human Rights Code; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Knights of Columbus engage efforts to oppose the unjust and religiously discriminatory aspects of this legislation by public statements, or other means to be determined by the State Board.

So, with Resolution #10 the committee recommends to delegates adoption to the State Council and recommends action as a discretion of the State Deputy. I am seeing Grand Knight Phil Horgan regarding resolution #10 as well as 11 and 12 as their Council is the Council bringing forward that and I encourage Grand Knight Phil to speak on this resolution #10.

I'm also with **Frank Guglielmin**, our Financial Secretary as delegates to this morning's convention. As many of you know, I've attended that last few State Conventions and put forward a number of resolutions on important matters for which we as Catholics have an obligation and/or duty to promote and serve. Many of you may know that I'm a leader with the Catholic Civil Rights League, an organization engaging in the fair hearing of Catholic positions on the public square, whether through advocacy, court engagements, and so on. Through that organization we have been involved with over 45 court interventions, 22 of them at the supreme court level in Canada in major issues of concerns to Catholics whether they be on education, conscience rights, pro-life and so on. Currently you should know that there are very interesting propositions being raised in this area on various conscience rights including dealing with COVID-19 and seeing we're part of a group promoting ethical research and application of COVID-19 vaccine both research and application. Perhaps you will be hearing about that more down the road. We're also involved in the constitutional challenge to the provincial bubble zone legislation which Fr. Tony Van Hee, a Jesuit priest in Ottawa has been arrested and now faces a criminal proceeding through the provincial legislation. We've brought forward resolutions to these conventions for the last 2 years on that issue alone and I think it is appropriate for me to take issue with the lack of engagement by the State Board in dealing with your unanimous support for opposition of the bubble zone. I've yet to see a statement, yet to see a contribution to the constitutional challenge. I'm hopeful that the State Board takes these resolutions seriously on a go forward basis because I think as I've heard from others when I make these propositions on previous occasions 10 or 15 of the would approach me and say it was the highlight of the weekend to be engaged in these matters.. I'm hoping in the future taking action both on past resolutions and the current one. Focusing on the resolution #10. This relates to opposition of the supporting youth legislation passed by the previous provincial government in 2017. If you read the preamble to the resolution it sets out

references to the church teachings and in fact the obligation we have as Catholics. If you're not familiar with the legislation or with this particular provision reverse is the authority that the parents may have over children and so as a result your teen age child may seek for example assistance from the State to ignore obligations, and perhaps seek things like gender reassignment and other kinds of propositions which are contrary to the faith. At the federal level, although it is not part of this resolution because it only got introduced in the earlier part of this year, we now have Bill C8 which is a ban on conversion therapy. So I move on this occasion and with the support of my Council and many others that we adopt Resolution 10 and that hopefully it can lead to engagement by the State Council going forward.

RESOLUTION 11-Supporting Parental Rights on Sexual Education Curriculum in Schools

SUBMITTED BY: San Damiano Council No. 15861

> WHEREAS: The government of Ontario is engaging in consultations regarding the content of the sexual education curriculum to be used in public and Catholic schools throughout the province; and

> WHEREAS: The Catechism (2223-2228) teaches that parents have the primary duty to educate their children, that they have the right to choose an education in accord with their convictions, and that public authorities have a duty to protect this right; and

> WHEREAS: The Knights of Columbus is a Catholic fraternal organization, which upholds the rights of Catholic parents; and

> WHEREAS: The Assembly of Catholic Bishops of Ontario in conjunction with Catholic educators and trustees released in 2012 the "Respecting Difference" resource, to promote equity and respect in Ontario Catholic schools; and

> WHEREAS: In February 2015, the Archbishop of Ottawa, voicing the concern of many Catholics, stated that the new Ontario sexual education curriculum as then proposed threatened the "fundamental right of parents to educate their children in the moral dimension of sexual behaviour"; and

WHEREAS: In April 2016, the Assembly of Catholic Bishops of Ontario released guidelines for sexual education in Catholic schools, affirming the rights of parents and the importance of fidelity to Church teaching; and

WHEREAS: In their July 2018 response to the repeal of the previously imposed curriculum, the Assembly of Catholic Bishops of Ontario affirmed the role of parents as the primary educators of Catholic students, and prayed that elected officials would listen intently to all voices in developing a new curriculum; and

WHEREAS: The Ontario government produced a revised version of its expectations for sexual and health education in 2019, which included early introduction of aspects of certain concepts despite objections from many parents;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the Ontario State supports the positions asserted by the Assembly of Catholic Bishops of Ontario as previously asserted in its various submissions; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Ontario State, in particular, asserts the right of parents to have comprehensive access to the content of the curriculum, to receive notice when their children are enrolled in classes with sexual education components, to receive notice of the specific lesson plans involving sexual education components in a timely fashion, or on request, and to be able to withdraw their children from classes or school activities on such topics if called by their conscience to do so, withdraw their children from classes or school activities on such topics if called by their conscience to do so; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Knights of Columbus engage in the ongoing consultation to express their support for these positions, through means to be determined by the State Board.

RESOLUTION 12 Opposing the Expansion of Medical Aid in Dying and Enhancing the Availability of Palliative Care

San Damiano Council No. 15861 **SUBMITTED BY:**

> WHEREAS: The government of Canada is engaging in consultations regarding the proposed expansion of medical aid in dying (MAiD), as currently permitted under the Criminal Code, to include advanced directives, reduced wait times, or access to the procedure for psychiatric patients; and

WHEREAS: According to best estimates, the percentage of Canadians accessing MAiD is approaching 2 percent of all deaths in Canada, with over 5,000 reported in 2019 (Euthanasia Prevention Coalition, January 2020); and

WHEREAS: The Parliament of Canada approved legislation by unanimous all-party support in 2017 to develop a national framework for palliative care by Dec. 11, 2018; and

WHEREAS: The framework document developed by that report and released on December 4, 2018, endorsed the **World Health Organization** (WHO) definition which states that palliative care should "neither hasten or postpone death"; and

WHEREAS: According to polling, 75 percent of Canadians would prefer to die at home, 60 percent of Canadians actually die in hospitals, and only 15 percent of Canadians have access to palliative home care services; and

WHEREAS: Though 87 percent of Canadians could benefit from palliative care at end-of-life, only 35 percent are receiving it, according to a recent report by the Canadian Institute for Health Information (source: Catholic Register, December 13, 2018); and

WHEREAS: More palliative care represents an opportunity to reduce costs, on the basis that a residential hospice bed is roughly one-third the cost of a hospital bed; and

WHEREAS: The federal government previously pledged \$6 billion to go toward palliative care and home care expansion, without expending such funds to date, but has recently extended the timeframe to spend this commitment to 2027; and

WHEREAS: The Knights of Columbus is a Catholic Fraternal organization, which defends the right to life of all human beings from the moment of conception to natural death, based on both scientific grounds and the teachings of the Church, which believes that all human beings deserve equal respect, as formed in the image and likeness of God;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED: That the Ontario State oppose efforts to expand Medical Aid in Dying as proposed by the federal government; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Ontario State promote a return to the commitment in favour of greater access to palliative care, from both the provincial and federal governments, by enhanced funding; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: That the Knights of Columbus engage efforts to promote enhanced access to palliative care from our public health care system via public statements, or other means to be determined by the State Board.

DAVID GELINAS, State Advocate

Now Resolution #12, the committee recommends delegates adoption to the State Council and recommends action at the discretion of the State Deputy. Worthy Grand Knight Phil Horgan I do have another screener up here and I'll leave you there just in case or to call back if we need a rebuttal on that. I do open the microphone to Brother El Chaar Charbel.

Brother El Chaar Charbel, Council 6519

Thank you. I was going to talk about Resolution #11. I do object to the Sex Education curriculum because we had a big opposition to curriculum sex education for children that reference without the

parent's consent, without parents right. We should not support the Ontario in such a regard. We are supposed to do this with the church teaching. In the catechism we have to get involved with what's the moral because as you know, Planned Parenthood, those for abortion organisations, they support sex education to promote the culture of their society. I do oppose this sex education curriculum that is happening.

Brother Charbel, unfortunately I have seen here you in the queue for Resolution #12 for Life and Resolution #11 has been adopted but I do thank you for your comments. I am going bring up and acknowledge Brother Alex Schadenberg who wants to speak on Resolution #12.

ALEX SCHADENBERG, Life Director, Council 6495, West Lorne

I just wanted to comment on number 12 because the resolution written by the Council previous to the Bill that has come out now, Bill C-7 which is being debated on the expansion of euthanasia in Canada. I would simply urge each Council, individual members and citizens as citizens of Canada to be contacting their members of parliament on this issue because it is now before us in parliament as a debated issue and the government is talking about expanding euthanasia to include a codicil which would ad previously requested death by euthanasia. But now, let's say they had a stroke, or their dementia has progressed, I am very confident they could still be killed by euthanasia. They also are expanding it by eliminating the waiting period. Someone could basically get approved in the morning and die in the afternoon. No chance to change their mind! They're also saying that this will not include people with mental illness but that is to be added to the Bill. This is a smokescreen. So, what I'm saying this is a time that we need to react to. In reading the Resolution I'm assuming it will be supported unanimously but the fact is that this is our time to act because it is actually being debated in Parliament and timing of the debate is difficult because of the COVID-19 virus. Thank you. God Bless you.

Thank you, Brother Alex. Are there any other speakers to speak on Resolution #12? Especially if there are any against. Seeing no other speakers requested in the queue the gavel indicates adoption of Resolution #12 to the State Council and recommends action at the discretion of the State Deputy.

CARRIED

Now I'm going to bring up Brother **Ted Majkot**. He is indicating there was no vote on Resolution #10. I'm assuming that would be the same request about 11 and 12 but as the State I just want to preamble this part. As the State Deputy indicated prior to giving me the gavel and as I began my part if there was no indication of speakers for a resolution, after a pause the dropping of the gavel indicates unanimous support and adoption of the resolution. I now open the mike to Brother **Ted Majkot**.

This is actually a point of order. Resolution 11, 12, 13, 14, 15 are all important resolutions. We should be having invoked on them, not just dropping a gavel saying this is what we're doing. In the past we have approved ...

He is out of order.

DAVID GELINAS, State Advocate

Thank you, Worthy State Deputy, just so you know that these instructions and these special circumstances have been approved by Supreme Council. Brothers, this is similar of how resolutions are conducted at the Supreme Convention and everybody was instructed twice upon the dropping of the gavel if there was no comments or request on a resolution.

RESOLUTION 13 Releasing All Programs in All Four Official Languages

SUBMITTED BY: Notre-Dame du Rosaire Council No. 9922

WHEREAS: The Knights of Columbus has four (4) official languages, English, French, Spanish and Polish.

WHEREAS: Several new Knights of Columbus programs are always introduced in English first, for example, the new Exemplification, the Faith and Action program ... and the Knights of Columbus does not introduce programs in French, Spanish and Polish at the same time.

WHEREAS: There is a lot of confusion in the regions or several English and French language Councils concerning ceremonies and programs. For example, a new member can do the new exemplification in English, but in French should do the three (3) separate ceremonies as before. Faith and Action program was introduced in French, months after it was introduced in English;

BE IT THEREFORE RESOLVED THAT: We encourage that the Knights of Columbus complete all programs and ceremonies in the four (4) official languages of the Knights of Columbus, English, French, Spanish and Polish before they are launched in all jurisdictions.

Moving forward, Resolution #13, the Council has withdrawn the resolution. The Committee has accepted their withdrawal and therefore Resolution #13 is officially withdrawn.

RESOLUTION 14 Amending the Standing Rules Governing the **Election of State Board Officers**

SUBMITTED BY: Our Lady of Fatima Council No. 3732 WHEREAS: The document "STANDING RULES GOVERNING ELECTION OF STATE BOARD OFFICERS FOR THE JURISDICTION OF ONTARIO, Published under the authority of the Ontario State Deputy as Appendix II of Article IV – Elections Section 24 of the By-Laws of the Ontario State Council Knights of Columbus – December 2018"; and

WHEREAS: The Preamble states, "In preparing this document, the team assigned to review the election process unanimously agreed that, in order to have an experienced line of succession, candidates should consider election to the position of State Warden and weigh in the option of up to eight years moving through the ranks of State Officers to eventually become State Deputy."; and

WHEREAS: The State Deputy will be possibly offering solutions, advice and counselling to Grand Knights, so he should have experienced the position of Grand Knight; and

WHEREAS: The State Deputy approves and appoints District Deputies, so he should have experienced the position of District Deputy; and

WHEREAS: The process of electing of one office takes approximately 45 minutes; and

WHEREAS: That valuable time for elections can be better utilized for important business; and

WHEREAS: To ensure a proper line of succession and continuity of leadership for the Ontario State Knights of Columbus.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: A new SECTION XII be added to the Ontario State Election Rules to read:

"SECTION XII – CANDIDATES' QUALIFICATIONS

- a. Any candidate for an Ontario State Officer position must have served a full term as Grand Knight;
- b. Any candidate for an Ontario State Officer position must have served a full term as District Deputy."

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED: This resolution will take effect, once adopted, for 2021 Ontario State Convention.

DAVID GELINAS, State Advocate

Resolution #14, the committee recommends delegates rejection of this resolution and I will give you a little bit of information and then I will open up the mike to people that want to speak. So, I was reminded that Section 92A of the laws of the Knights of Columbus establishes the qualifications of members who speak to hold office and 92A states that only members who have been initiated in the first 3 degrees of the order shall be eligible for any office being at a subordinate Council level, State level or even the Supreme Council and there are two provisions to this which add further qualifications. Section 7 provides that a candidate must be an insured member to be qualified to be a Board of Director and section 12D indicates so that an insured member is for the office of State Deputy. These are the only two qualifications or prerequisites for holding office and the laws make no provision for State Councils to add any others so accordingly the Ontario State Council has the authority to establish its own qualifications or prerequisites for State Office beyond those set forth in Section 92A of the laws of the Knights of Columbus. So again, I remind you the Committee recommends rejection and I open up the mike to Brother Martin Marko to speak on Resolution #14

MARTIN MARKO, Council 15999

I'm just asking everybody to read the logical preamble there. This resolution is to refine our rules for Ontario elections adding section 12 to our thing. It wouldn't affect Supreme at all but we're just looking to have a higher standard of qualified leaders running and if you read the preamble it all makes logical sense, so this is just for Ontario, that's all. Thank you.

DAVID GELINAS, State Advocate

Thank you, Brother Martin. I would like to bring up Brother William Webber to speak on Resolution #14.

WILLIAM WEBBER, GK Council 7851, Huntsville

I wasn't sure before we started that this was going to be recommended not to be adopted and I'd just like to support that position for a couple of reasons, not just because of the rules, but just from a common-sense point of view. If I'm going to be a Director of the Hospital Board, I don't have to be a doctor. If I'm going to be a Service Manager for the Canadian Tire garage, I don't have to be a mechanic, so you don't have to have been somebody in a position just to be able to do another job. It would be recommended that if you had the more experience people doing it, great, but it's not necessary and that's the difference. It shouldn't be absolutely necessary. Thank you.

DAVID GELINAS, State Advocate

Thank you, Brother William. I see two other speakers and I bring to the mike, Brother Charles William French.

CHARLES WILLIAM FRENCH, Council 1626

Hello there, since the recommendation is to not support this, I think it answers my concern because I kind of agree the Ontario State position. I would actually agree that they should serve as a Grand Knight but anything beyond that would be very inappropriate because I do think it restricts the democratic process and may even stifle fresh ideas and ways of attracting younger leaders so, since I fully support the recommendation not to kind of support the motion and so I don't have to go any further. Thank you.

Thank you, Brother William. I bring up to the mike to Brother Carl Pearson.

CARL PEARSON, Council 1394

Thank you, Worthy State Deputy, Brothers. I'd like to speak on Resolution 14. Our Council, we can see that experience is essential to become a member of the Ontario State Board but the process for deciding on the installing of District Deputy and District Warden needs to be addressed first, as it states in this resolution, they are appointments. I agree with the past speaker that the democratic process has to be heard for these positions before can proceed. Thank you.

DAVID GELINAS, State Advocate

Thank you, Brother. Worthy State Deputy, I don't know how many that was for or against. So, I will bring up 1 more at this time. I will bring up Brother **Ted** (**Theodore**) **Majkot** to speak on Resolution 14.

TED MAJKOT, Council 9850, Bracebridge

I'm going to suggest people vote against this. I understand the thinking behind it but you don't necessarily have to have been a Grand Knight or a District Deputy in order to have ideas for State Board. We're going to be restricting our talent field by doing this and I don't think that's a good idea. We should be open to anyone, any ideas we should be willing to listen to all members. All members have a right to speak at meetings. They should also have a right to run at meetings at any level. So that's my position. Thank you.

DAVID GELINAS, State Advocate

Thank you, Brother Theodore. Worthy State Deputy, I believe we've had equal number for and against the resolution so at this time you have the recommendation of the committee to reject so you are going to vote. If the person can bring up the poll. We are voting on the adoption of the resolution for number 1 and number 2 would be to reject the resolution.

DAVID PETERS, State Deputy

Worthy State Advocate, we are ready.

DAVID GELINAS, State Advocate

Thank you, Worthy State Deputy. Remind everybody, hit 1 on your key to vote to adopt and hit 2 on your key to reject the resolution. You are now open to vote. Brothers again just to remind you #1 is to adopt the resolution and #2 is to reject the resolution. If you wish to change your mind just hit the key and the program will automatically change it for you. Now we have another 20 seconds for that. Thank you, Brothers, the voting has stopped. We ask the State Secretary Marcel, would you give the results for that.

With a total of 318 votes cast, the resolution is rejected.

REJECTED

RESOLUTION 15 Amending the Constitution and Making Two Votes **Per Council the Ongoing Rule**

SUBMITTED BY: Holy Cross Council No. 10617

> WHEREAS: The current rules require an annual resolution by the State Deputy to allow Councils that are represented by only one person to have two votes on any matter; and

> WHEREAS: Restricting Councils with only one representative to have only one vote disadvantages less financially solvent Councils that cannot subsidize travel and other costs for their delegates; and

> WHEREAS: Allowing Councils with only one delegate to cast two votes was the practice for many years and this should be the rule for all state jurisdictions without the need for an annual resolution by the State Deputy;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: Section 12(e) of the Charter, Constitution and Laws of the Knights of Columbus be repealed and replaced with the following: "Any Council in the State jurisdiction may be represented at the State Convention by the Grand Knight or, in his absence, any duly elected Past Grand Knight, or by the alternate of one of them, who shall be entitled to two votes (for a maximum of two votes per Council) on any matter coming before the annual meeting."

Ontario State Board SUBMITTED BY:

WHEREAS meetings held by electronic means such as the Internet or telephone are more frequently being conducted;

AND

WHEREAS Robert's Rules of Order RONR (11th ed.), p. 97, ll. 6-30 require that in order for business to be transacted at an electronic meeting, they must specifically be allowed in an organization's By-laws;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that Section 26 of the By-laws Ontario State Council, Knights of Columbus be amended to append:

"Meetings of the State Officers may be conducted through the use of Internet meeting services designated by the State Deputy that support visible displays identifying those participating, identifying those seeking recognition to speak, showing the text of pending motions, and showing the results of votes. Any business discussed during a telephone conference call must be confirmed at the next in-person or Internet meeting.";

So that Section 26 reads as follows:

Section 26: "Meetings of State Officers: There shall be a quarterly meeting of the State Officers in each year and subordinate Councils shall forward to the State Secretary any matters they desire to bring to the attention to the State Officers. Other meetings may be called at the discretion of the State Deputy. No error or omission in giving such notice for a meeting of the State Officers shall invalidate such meeting or invalidate or make void any proceedings taken or had at such meeting and any Officer may at any time waive notice of any such meeting and may ratify and approve of any or all proceedings taken or had thereat. Meetings of the State Officers may be conducted through the use of Internet meeting services designated by the State Deputy that support visible displays identifying those participating, identifying those seeking recognition to speak, showing the text of pending motions, and showing the results of votes. Any business discussed during a telephone conference call must be confirmed at the next in-person or Internet meeting."

Resolution #14: State Board to Purchase Blanket

Coverage of Liability Insurance for all

Councils in Ontario

SUBMITTED BY: Ontario State Board

WHEREAS: At the 108th annual general State convention meeting in 2011, the delegates in Ontario passed the resolution from Council #8242 to obtain liability insurance policy covering all the Councils of Ontario State;

AND

WHEREAS: The Ontario State Board presented a report on the previous year's resolution about liability insurance to the 2012 annual general State Convention on the details on how this liability coverage would be established;

WHEREAS: Ontario State Board has provided liability insurance at group rates to Councils since January 1st, 2013 to protect their executive officers and patrons at their Council sponsored programs and events;

AND

WHEREAS: Ontario State Board recently had an expert (risk manager) review the current 2021 liability insurance policy and there was one main concern they brought to our attention and which they suggested needed to be addressed by the State Board; this is to close up the liability risks associated with the Councils that do not purchase liability insurance; AND

WHEREAS: The Councils that "opt out" of purchasing liability insurance (State provided or other) for their Council and executive officers puts current and past State Board officers and ultimately all the Councils in Ontario at financial risk of litigation claims against a Council without liability insurance protection;

AND

WHEREAS: The best and only solution to solve this financial risk is for State Board to purchase a blanket coverage of liability insurance protection for every Council in Ontario and all its executive and director officers and bill the Councils their portion of the total expense of this insurance coverage policy;

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: With the full intent of the 2011 resolution from Council #8242 in mind; Ontario State Council will purchase a blanket liability insurance coverage policy every calendar year to cover every Council in Ontario State and all Council Directors and Officers and bill proportionally to each Council every January starting January 1st, 2022;

THEREFORE, BE IT ALSO RESOLVED THAT: The only exceptions to this blanket insurance policy would be Councils that provide acceptable proof of liability insurance coverage for their Council including Directors & Officers coverage to State Board by December 15th of each year.

Resolution #19: Expansion of Qualifying Evidence for Disability Exemptions under Section 118(e) of the Charter, Constitution and Laws of the Order **SUBMITTED BY:** St. Mark Parish, Council No 10874 WHEREAS supporting our Brother Knights is the foremost priority of every Knights of Columbus Council: AND WHEREAS the growth of the Order relies on the retention of current members; WHEREAS Section 118(e) of the Charter, Constitution and Laws (CCL) of the Order indicates that members who are disabled and cannot engage in employment for no less than six months can be relieved from the payment of all Council dues and Supreme and State per capita; AND WHEREAS Section 118(e) specifies that "evidence satisfactory to the Supreme Council of such disability" is required to process a disability waiver, which currently includes a certification from Health and Human Services, a national revenue agency, Veterans Affairs, or from an attending physician; **AND** WHEREAS many members who receive disability benefits receive them via direct deposit, making it very difficult to obtain proof of benefits without a digital account from the relevant agency, placing a significant burden on members who are unable to access these resources; **AND** WHEREAS a note from a physician is not covered by provincial and most private health insurance plans, placing a substantial financial barrier to members who require this exemption to maintain their good standing status in the Order; AND WHEREAS COVID-19 has halted almost all non-essential in-person medical appointments, making it problematic for older disabled members to obtain medical documentation from their physician; AND WHEREAS an expansion in the accepted documentation for disability exemptions would demonstrate the first principle of our Order, Charity, to our members who are disabled and in desperate need of our support; THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED THAT: the Supreme Council expand the evidence accepted to obtain a disability exemption under Section 118(e) in the CCL to include a letter from a Brother Knight's spouse, child(ren), essential caregiver, or power of attorney which outlines the injury/disease and confirms the need for dues and per capita to be waived. □ Adopt and Refer to Supreme ∐ Reject

Dear Advisory Council of the Order of Canada,

This letter is being sent to you in accordance with resolution #13 from our State Council Convention held on May xx, 2021.

The aim of this letter is to officially petition – and explain the reasoning behind our request – the Advisory Council of the Order of Canada in their consideration that the Order of Canada that was presented to Canadian Mr. Peter Dalglish be rescinded.

Notwithstanding the initial merits of him being made a Member of the Order of Canada on November 18, 2016, Mr. Dalglish has recently made himself unworthy of membership in the Order of Canada. To wit, on April 8, 2018, Mr. Dalglish was arrested by Nepal Police from Kavre District (near Kathmandu) on allegations of child rape. On June 10, 2019, he was found guilty of raping two young boys ages 12 and 14, respectively. He was sentenced in January 2020 and is currently serving an 8-year sentence in a Nepalese prison.

It is not fair to the other members of the Order of Canada nor in the best interests of the Order that Mr. Dalglish remain a member. Therefore, we are seeking remedial action.

Draft Letter to Premier Ford and Attorney General Doug Downey to Oppose Bubble Zones Around Abortion Clinics
Dear Premier Ford and Attorney General Downey,
I write on behalf of our Knights of Columbus Council No, which represents over men in our local community, based primarily at parish. Our council, by extension, represents over families who work actively to enhance community service and volunteer activities.
The "Safe Access to Abortion Services Act", was enacted into Ontario law by the previous Wynne government on February 1, 2018. (Conservative MPPs voted against this legislation at third reading.)
The law imposes outright suppression of pro-life viewpoints, with the invention of the need for broad areas of "no go" zones, around abortion clinics, and potentially pharmacies and hospitals. The law is an overreach on the law's dubious objectives, and would impose unfair restrictions on peaceful counselling, or prayer efforts, such as Forty Days for Life, which has been active in peaceful prayer sessions for many years.
Our Bishops and numerous Christian and Catholic advocacy organizations have opposed the law as an engagement of censorship, or denial of speech based on its content, to prevent opposing viewpoints to be made available to women and their caregivers, and the general public on matters that are explicitly about life and death.
At recent provincial/State Conventions, the Knights of Columbus of Ontario, representing over 50,000 member and their families, passed resolutions opposing this legislation as an affront to our constitutional protections of freedom of speech, freedom of assembly, and freedom of religion and conscience.
This unfair and unconstitutional law has now resulted in charges against a Roman Catholic priest, Father Tony Van Hee, S.J., arising from a peaceful protest within such a bubble zone in Ottawa, even in circumstances where a freedom of speech message was advanced.
Your government has an opportunity to deal with this oppressive legislation, by seeking its repeal.
Please advise of your position on this extreme piece of legislation, and your intentions on dealing with it.
We intend to make known your views in our community, so a response is required, failing which we will report on your intransigence on an issue that Conservative MPPs previously opposed.

Appendix C: Draft Letter to Oppose Bill C-6 – Proposed Ban on Conversion Therapy Dear MP. I write on behalf of our Knights of Columbus Council No. ____, which represents over ___ men in our local community, based primarily at ____ parish. Our council, by extension, represents over ____ families who work actively to enhance community service and volunteer activities. Bill C-6 is currently before the Parliament of Canada, which seeks to criminalize "conversion therapy" as it has been defined in the legislation. Our Canadian Bishops and a host of Christian and Catholic groups have opposed the overreach of this proposed legislation, and the effort to criminalize pastoral or parental counselling on issues of sexual orientation, conduct, or gender expression, arising in the context of the well-being of children. Instead of focusing on coercive thirdparty treatments, the bill would expose parents and faith leaders to potential criminal prosecution for raising children according to the tenets of our faith. On Oct. 7, 2020, the Canadian Conference of Catholic Bishops stated: "The Bill makes no provision for legitimate diversity concerning viewpoints on human sexuality arising from religious beliefs, from philosophical debate, or from scientific and medical study; nor does it make any provision for conscientious dissent related to such matters in forums of teaching or public presentations." The Knights of Columbus maintain that parents and faith leaders retain a primary and recognized role in dealing with the well-being and human dignity of children, especially those in their care and upbringing. The proposed law exposes such individuals to potential criminal prosecution. The Ontario Knights of Columbus, representing 50,000 members across the province, have expressed their opposition to this proposed unjust law, as an affront to our constitutional protections for parental freedoms and freedom of speech, conscience and religion. We urge you to do likewise. Please advise us of your position on this bill, as we wish to bring your position to the attention of our members and their families.

That contrasts with polling suggesting that 87 per cent of Canadians could benefit from palliative care at end-of-life, according to a recent report by the Canadian Institute for Health Information (source: Catholic Register, December 18, 2018).

Instead, we note that palliative care hospices are perennially underfunded in maintaining their operations (Catholic Register, November 24, 2020).

The Knights of Columbus is a Catholic Fraternal organization, which defends the right to life of all human beings from the moment of conception to natural death, based on both scientific grounds and the teachings of the Church, which believes that all human beings deserve equal respect, as formed in the image and likeness of God.

The Knights of Columbus, as faithful members of the Catholic Church, stand with our Bishops in opposing the expansion of euthanasia and lethal injection, which by the recent provisions of Bill C-7 will expand access to assisted suicide to some of the most marginal in our communities, including those suffering from mental illness.

Our provincial/State Council, representing over 50,000 Knights and their families in the province of Ontario has passed several resolutions in recent years to enhance palliative care funding and delivery in Canada.

By-laws of the Ontario State Council, Knights of Columbus



By-laws of the Ontario State Council, Knights of Columbus

Section 8: Committees, Appointment of: Unless otherwise determined by the State Council, the appointment of all committees shall rest with the State Deputy or Presiding Officer, and he shall be ex-officio a member of all committees. In the interval between the annual meetings of the State Council, where circumstances demand it, the State Deputy is empowered to appoint one or more special committees which shall report to the next annual meeting of the State Council. These reports shall be made in writing and published in the State Convention Booklet of the succeeding year for approval of the State Council. No expense shall be incurred by any committee without the express authority of the State Council or of the State Officers.

Section 9: Membership ... In What Section ... Who Present: All meetings of the State Council shall be conducted in the Third Section and shall be open to all Third Degree members in good standing, provided; however, that none but members of the State Council shall have the right to participate in its proceedings, except that Past State Deputies, (other than the last living Past State Deputy), and District Deputies, shall be permitted the privileges of membership in the State Council, but without the right to vote therein. The State Warden shall admit none but Third Degree members in good standing, except in the case of newly formed Councils or if a motion is presented and approved at the commencement of the Annual General meeting allowing First and Second Degree members to be present without the right to participate in the proceedings of the State Council.

Section 10: Resolutions, Etc.: All resolutions, petitions, and all proposed amendments to the By-Laws shall be forwarded to the State Advocate on or before the 1st of February. The State Advocate shall forward copies of all such resolutions, petitions, or proposed amendments to the District Deputies, to the State Officers, and to the Subordinate Councils for their consideration and the State Advocate shall refer such resolutions, petitions or proposed amendments to the Committee on Resolutions when appointed.

Section 11: Committee on Resolutions: The Committee on Resolutions shall be appointed by the State Deputy and the State Advocate shall be the chairman of the Committee. The Committee on Resolutions shall meet on a day preceding the Annual General Meeting of the State Council and shall prepare a report on all matters referred to it and shall present such report to the State Council meeting together with such suggestions as may assist in implementing the report.

Section 12: Resolution, Etc. Rules of Presentation and Rules of Order: Resolutions, petitions and amendments to By-Laws shall be presented, discussed and voted upon in accordance with the Rules of Presentation and Rules of Order in effect at the time of the Annual General meeting or as so amended by a simple majority of the delegates at the Annual General meeting to which these changes are presented.

Section 13: Limitations of Speaking: When a member is about to speak he shall rise go to the nearest microphone, be recognized, address the Chair and give his name and the number of his Council; , the member shall then confine his remarks to the subject under discussion. No member shall speak longer than five minutes without permission of the Chair, nor more than once upon any question until all others who desire to speak have spoken.

Section 14: Roll Call, When Ordered: The roll shall not be taken for the yeas and nays unless requested by one-third of the members present entitled to vote.

Section 15: New Business: any motion that comes from the floor under the Heading of New Business becomes a Notice of Motion and will come before the floor at the next Ontario State Council General Meeting as a Resolution provided the proposer of the new business submits this matter in the proper manner as described above for the submission resolutions, petitions or amendments to By-Laws.

Section 16: Where No Standing Rule: In the absence of a standing rule, Robert's Rules of Order as amended shall govern as to rules of procedure.

ARTICLE III – FINANCES

Section 17: State Per Capita Assessment: For the purpose of defraying the expenses and obligations of the State Council, there shall be levied against and collected from all the Subordinate Councils in Ontario annually, a per capita assessment based on the number of members of the respective Councils as of the January 1st Membership and Insurance Progress Reports membership records from Supreme and as modified by Section 17 subsections B. and C. below.

Section 18: Assessments, When Payable: The sum, as ascertained in accordance with this Section shall be due and payable by each subordinate Council thirty days prior to the date of the Annual Meeting of the State Council. Subordinate Councils which have not paid this assessment or any other assessment or charge from State or Supreme forfeit the Councils' voting privileges.

- The per capita assessment may be increased annually by an amount equal to the C.O.L.A. increase for the previous year effecting January 1st, of the New Year.
- **B**. Councils shall be credited for each Honorary Life Member and Disabled Member listed on the above noted report equal to the amount of the per capita assessment approved for that year.
- C. Councils shall be credited for each inactive insurance member listed on the above noted report in an amount equal to the difference between the total of the Supreme annual assessment and the Ontario State Council per capita assessment less the credit indicated by Supreme for said members.

Section 19: To Whom Paid: All monies owed to the State Council shall be promptly satisfied by cheque, draft, or money order made payable to "Ontario State Council, Knights of Columbus", and all such payments shall be forwarded to the State Treasurer at the address of the Ontario State Office, or as he may direct.

Section 20: Deposit of Funds: All monies or securities of the State Council shall be promptly deposited by the State Treasurer or as he may direct in a Chartered Bank to the credit of: "Ontario State Council, Knights of Columbus".

Section 21: Signing of Cheques: All cheques drawn against the account of the Ontario State Council, Knights of Columbus, shall be signed by the State Treasurer and countersigned by the State Deputy.

Section 22: State Treasurer's Record: The State Treasurer or his designate shall keep a proper record of the receipt and disbursement of all State Council funds as well as of monies owed to the State Council and all monies owed by the State Council.

Section 23: State Treasurer's Bond: The State Treasurer shall be insured or bonded for the faithful performance of his duties for such amount and in such a manner as shall be determined by the State Officers. The expense of the said bond shall be borne by the State Council and the evidence thereof shall be given to the State Deputy.

ARTICLE IV – ELECTIONS

Section 24: State Officers the Ontario State elected Officers shall be elected in accordance with The Standing Rules Governing Election of State Board Officers for the jurisdiction of Ontario (Appendix II attached)."

Section 25: Delegates and Alternates to the Annual Supreme Council Meeting: Delegates and Alternates to the Annual Supreme Council Meeting shall be chosen as described in the document Purpose, Structure and Rules for Diocesan Associations and Selection of Delegates to the Supreme Convention originally published November 2005 and Revision # 7 dated January 2012 or as shall be amended from time to time by the Ontario State Board. (Appendix III attached)

ARTICLE V - MISCELLANEOUS

Section 26: Meetings of State Officers: There shall be a quarterly meeting of the State Officers in each year and subordinate Councils shall forward to the State Secretary any matters they desire to bring to the attention to the State Officers. Other meetings may be called at the discretion of the State Deputy. No error or omission in giving such notice for a meeting of the State Officers shall invalidate such meeting or invalidate or make void any proceedings taken or had at such meeting and any Officer may at any time waive notice of any such meeting and may ratify and approve of any or all proceedings taken or had thereat.

Section 27: Ontario State Bulletin: If the State Officers consider it advisable an official publication of the State Council, known as the Ontario State Bulletin, may be published. The purpose of the publication shall be to keep the members interested in and informed of the work of the Order in Ontario.

Section 28: Expenses - State Officers: All proper and necessary expenses incurred by the State Deputy in the discharge of his official duties, except those chargeable to the Supreme Council, shall be borne by the State Council. For stenographic and clerical assistance, the State Deputy shall be allowed such sum as the State Officers may determine. All other State Officers shall be allowed their proper and necessary expenses as approved by the State Deputy.

Section 29: Allowance for Attendance: State Officers, Past State Deputies, District Deputies, State Chairmen and Delegates in attendance at the State Council Meeting shall be granted from the funds of the State Council, an allowance as prescribed by the State Board.

Section 30: Audit: The State Treasurer shall have the books audited as of the 30th day of **June** of each year and he shall have the duly appointed State Auditor present a draft copy of that audit to the State Board Officers no later than October 30 next following for review and approval from presenting to the State Council.

Section 31: Reports of State Officers: The State Deputy, State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Chaplain, State Advocate, State Warden and Chairmen of standing of special committees shall prepare an Annual Report and forward the same to the State Secretary or his designate not later than the 15th of March for publication in the State Convention Booklet.

Section 32: Forwarding Resolutions, etc.: The State Secretary shall promptly forward a copy of all resolutions, petitions or proposed amendments to the By-Laws which have been adopted by the State Council to the Supreme Council for consideration. Within one month after the meeting of the Supreme Council the State Deputy shall report in writing to the State Secretary, the action taken by the Supreme Council thereon and the State Advocate shall furnish such information to the Subordinate Councils.

Section 33: Reports Re: Subordinate Council Officers: The Financial Secretary of each Subordinate Council shall after the election of Officers and appointment of Service Program Personnel, prepare a list of the names and addresses of the Subordinate Council Officers and Service Program Personnel so elected or appointed, upon forms which the Supreme Secretary shall provide (at present Form 185 and 365). He shall forward these forms to the Supreme Office with a copy to the State Office, no later than the 15th of June.

Section 34: Reports Re: Subordinate Council Activities: The Grand Knight and Lecturer of each Subordinate Council shall prepare a joint report of the Council's activities for the twelve previous months and shall forward the same to the State Program Chairman not later than the 1st day of April.(at present Form SP-7 and Form STSP)

Section 35: Printing of Proceedings: The State Secretary shall have prepared and printed a report of the proceedings of the State Council meeting. One copy of such report shall be provided at the succeeding Annual General meeting to each State Officer, District Deputy, and Subordinate Council Delegate(s).

Section 36: Quorum: A majority of the registered members of the State Council at the State Convention hall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business. Less than a majority may adjourn from day to day or may adjourn sine die after the completion of the regular order of business.

Section 37: By-Laws - How Amended: These By-Laws or any part thereof may be amended or repealed at any annual meeting of the State Council by a majority vote and the said amendment or repeal shall be effective upon the approval thereof by Supreme Board of Directors.

STANDING RULES GOVERNING **ELECTION OF STATE BOARD OFFICERS** FOR THE JURISDICTION OF ONTARIO

PREAMBLE

In preparing this document, the team assigned to review the election process unanimously agreed that, in order to have an experienced line of succession, candidates should consider election to the position of State Warden and weigh in the option of up to eight years moving through the ranks of State Officers to eventually become State Deputy.

I. INTRODUCTION

a. The intent of this document is to provide a guide to the policies and procedures regarding the election of State Board Officers in the jurisdiction of Ontario.

II. WHEN ELECTIONS CONVENED

- a. State Council shall be convened annually between the first day of April to and including the first day of June in each year by the State Deputy for the election of officers, and for the transaction of such business and the enactment of such rules and regulations as may be consistent with the charter and laws of the Supreme Council. (SEC. 13 Charter Constitution
- b. Until advised to the contrary, the annual meeting of the Ontario State Council will be held on the weekend in May commonly known as the Victoria Day Weekend.

III. CAMPAIGNING

- a. All expenses are the responsibility of the candidate
- b. Everyone is expected to exercise good judgment in all activities involving the election of State Officers in keeping with the spirit and intent of fraternity within the laws and regulations of the Order.
- c. Candidates have a maximum limit of \$2,000 (applicable taxes) for their electoral expenses. These expenses include in kind gifts, printed materials, t-shirts, buttons, etc. A report of their expenses must be filed no later than June 15th to the State Office. Candidates and elected officers not reporting their expenses by the deadline will forfeit any office won in the election, is ineligible to be elected and may not be appointed to any office until after the next election.
- d. Campaigning can be done anywhere in the jurisdiction of Ontario.
- e. Candidates may speak at the Diocesan Association / Zone meetings.
- f. Candidates SHALL NOT REQUEST ENDORSEMENT FROM State Board Officers or Chairmen, NOR may they use their name(s) in election related correspondence.
- g. Where a State Chairman is a candidate, he will be allowed to present his portfolios to the annual Convention at the pre-established times.
- h. It is the responsibility of each candidate to ensure that anyone advocating his candidacy also complies with these guidelines. As honorable men, Catholic gentlemen and brother Knights of Columbus, it is our belief that the consciences of all involved will assure a fair and fraternal process that will further strengthen the Ontario State Council.

IV. CAMPAIGN ADVERTISING

- a. One mail out of campaign material will be sent by the State Office. Candidates and their supporters wishing to send out a flyer/resume, must send it to the State Office no later than April 1st of each year. The format will be as prescribed by the Board; no variations are allowed. No material can be sent after the deadline. If desired, a candidate may provide information translated at their own expense.
- b. This mail out will also be posted on the State website after April 2.
- c. Candidates are permitted to send to Councils or members any flyers, resumes, or mass electronic communications announcing or supporting their candidacy.
- d. All advertising will be done in a positive manner.
- e. No banners or advertisement will be posted in the meeting / breakout rooms.
- f. Distribution of advertisements is forbidden during religious ceremonies.
- g. Documents may be distributed at the entrance of the meeting / breakout rooms only with prior permission of the State Deputy.
- h. A table will be provided to each candidate at the Convention on which he may place a display.
- i. In accordance with hotel regulations, banners and posters are NOT to be hung on doors or walls in conference rooms or hotel rooms or suites.

V. HOSPITALITY SUITES

- a. Candidates are not permitted to host a hospitality suite. Councils are not permitted to host a hospitality suite in support of a candidate for State Office.
- b. Candidates can visit hospitality suites of other Councils, but they are not allowed to use this as a venue to campaign. No buttons, flyers, t-shirts advertising the candidate are permitted to be distributed in Council hospitality suites. While in the Hospitality Suites candidates may not give speeches.
- The State Board will assign an area and time, where candidates may set up their tables to campaign. Delegates may visit this area to meet the candidate.

VI. ELECTION PROCESS

- a. The election of State Board Officers will be conducted by the Immediate Past State Deputy under the authority of the State Deputy in accordance with the Charter, Constitution and Laws of the Order and the By Laws of Ontario State Council.
- b. Candidates wishing to run for the State Board may file their nomination papers with the State Office no earlier then January 1st. Only then, a candidate can start his campaigning.
- c. One mail out to Councils will be done ALSO by the State Board.
- d. In order to have materials sent in that mailing, nomination forms and campaign materials must be received at the State Office by April 1st
- e. Once nomination is received, the candidates name and photo will be placed on the State Website. (Candidate to provide photo)
- f. Upon the start of elections at the Convention, the nominator will announce his name, position and council affiliation and will have a maximum of 2 minutes in which to propose his candidate.
- g. The seconder of the nomination will only be permitted enough time to announce his name, position council affiliation and acknowledge his seconding of the candidate.
- h. Once all of the nominators have finished their remarks in relation to their Candidates, candidates will be given a maximum of 5 minutes to address the meeting. Candidates will be asked to speak in random order by a draw of names. If candidate needs to make a speech for a second office, he will be allotted 2 minutes for the second speech.

- i. Candidates must be nominated in writing on the proper form prior to closing of nominations for all positions for which he has an interest.
- j. Voting will be conducted at the business session following nominations or as designated by the State Deputy. No proxy votes.
- k. Voting will take place by secret ballot. Delegates will write the name of the candidate on their ballot. The names of the candidates will be listed in the voting booth in alphabetical order.
- No campaigning will be permitted in the waiting line when delegates are in line to vote, and business area.
- m. Each candidate can appoint a scrutineer to observe the counting of the ballots. Scrutineers will observe the process but are not permitted to participate in the counting of the ballots. Once inside the room where the ballots are counted they will not be permitted to leave until the results of the ballot have been announced to the Convention.
- n. Prior to the voting at least three tellers shall be appointed to count the ballots and report the results to the Immediate Past State Deputy. These tellers shall be Past State Deputies as appointed by the State Deputy. If there is less, then 3 PSD present the IPSD will appoint a replacement.
- o. Calls for office. Three calls for nominations will take place as follows: 1st call at District Deputies meeting in December, 2nd call February 1st and the 3rd call March 15th at noon.
- p. Nominations will be closed at 12 noon on April 1st.

VII. WHO MAY VOTE

- a. Only accredited delegates in possession of a valid voting card may vote.
- b. Councils represented by two delegates at the Convention are entitled to two votes.
- c. Councils sending one delegate are entitled to two votes cast by their single delegate provided he is in possession of the two voting cards for his Council. (This will be determined prior to the Convention by a vote by the majority of the Councils in the jurisdiction)
- d. District Deputies and PSD may not possess a voting card, and do not have the right to vote. District Deputies and PSD can move and discuss motions, but voting remains the responsibility of delegates.
- e. Delegates of Councils which are in arrears for current or prior annual state per capita fees will not be accredited.

VIII. SEQUENCE OF ELECTION

a. The voting will be carried out first for the position of State Deputy, followed by State Secretary, State Treasurer, State Advocate and State Warden.

IX. WHAT CONSTITUTES ELECTION

- a. At the close of nominations for any position, should there be only one nominee, that person will be declared elected by acclamation.
- b. At the close of nominations for any position, should there be more than one nominee; election to that position will be accomplished by a candidate gaining a simple majority of 50% plus 1 vote of the eligible ballots cast.
- If no candidate achieves a simple majority of 50% plus 1 vote of the eligible ballots cast on any ballot, then, in addition to the candidate who received the least number of votes being dropped, all those candidates who receive 10% or less of the votes cast, will be dropped from the subsequent ballot.

X. DEATH OR RESIGNATIONS

a. When a State Board Officer resigns from office or passes away during his term, except for the State Deputy, the State Board will appoint a Past State Deputy to complete the remainder of his term of office. The Past State Deputy so appointed shall not be eligible to seek election for the position at the next Convention.

XI. VIOLATIONS.

- a. If a candidate violates any of these rules, a formal complaint must be filed in writing to the **Immediate Past State Deputy for investigation.**
- b. A violation review team consisting of the three most recent PSDs will review and investigate the complaint, including its validity.
- c. If found guilty of violating these rules, the candidate's name will be removed from the ballot for the entire election. (all positions.)




