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
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ABOUT THE AUTHOR

This was the mission my administration embraced. Today, the Knights of Columbus in Ontario is once again a beacon of Catholic leadership, community engagement, and unwavering service. As I near the close of my term, I invite you to reflect on the highlights and accomplishments from these two remarkable fraternal years.

Marketing and Community Outreach

Special 125th Anniversary Jubilee Logo

The idea of commemorating our 125th anniversary was conceived nearly five years ago. Initially envisioned as a modest, localized celebration, the plan evolved significantly in response to the global pandemic. COVID-19 lockdowns made it clear that we needed something extraordinary to shake off the inertia that had set in. Too many of our once-active members had grown accustomed to inactivity.

In response, we launched a comprehensive marketing campaign, structured into three pillars:

1. **Regional Activities** to reconnect with our legacy and showcase our community impact.
2. **Aggressive Publicity** to amplify our presence.
3. **Commemorative Merchandise** available through our online webstore.

Regional Activities

Activities included the restoration of tombstones at Notre Dame Cemetery in Ottawa; the restoration of the Carhagouha Cross in Midland and the Pray for Peace Monument in Windsor; a pilgrimage to the St. Kateri Shrine in Montréal; and a special celebration hosted by Council #485 in Ottawa. These are just a few examples of our provincial commemoration outreach effort.



Honoring OUR LEGACY

Knights in Ontario restore the tombstones of past leaders as they prepare to celebrate the jurisdiction's 125th anniversary

On the evening of Aug. 13, Ontario State Deputy Steve Poole sat in front of a granite monument, methodically repairing the faded lettering on a tombstone. Making the grave of Father John J. O'Connell, a founding member of Ontario's first Knights of Columbus council, it was the third night Poole had personally restored an Ontario State Deputy's tombstone. Each time took about three hours to complete, but Poole didn't mind, he was just one Knight honoring another.

Poole finished his task just in time for the Ontario State Deputy Memorial Dinner at the Ontario State Deputy's Club in Ottawa. The dinner is a special event for the Order of Ontario, including its past state deputies — based in the last 100 years — and the Ontario State Council established all night of the Knights' tombstones as part of a series of initiatives to commemorate the jurisdiction's upcoming 125th anniversary in 2025.

"We are acknowledging the legacy upon which we are building our success today, both on their successes and on their sacrifices," State Deputy Poole explained. "Being in the Ontario State Council of Ontario, he explained that the restoration was "inspired by love and a sacred memory of our dearly departed," and the responsibility to pay for those who have gone before us. "Upon reflection during the month of November, we are reminded of our duty to the regard."

The Order of Ontario began with Ontario Council #485, chartered Jan. 28, 1900. While investigating the history of Ontario's Knights in a series of articles, Poole discovered that more Ontario state deputies are buried in St. James Cemetery than any other site.

"That got my interest going, so I went out to the cemetery to see these tombstones," Poole said. "I was that they were

with not and didn't mean was growing on them and the following had all faded. Many of these tombstones date back to the 1920s and '30s."

The state council of Ontario is within the boundaries, and a contractor was hired this past summer to provide work and clean up the tombstones and later to install the stones that had become overgrown and buried in dirt and grass.

One thing the contractor would not restore, however, was the faded inscriptions on faces of the Knights' tombstones. So Poole took matters into his own hands.

"I had, I think, somebody's got to do it. So I thought some paint and a pencil work, and all that," he said. "The process, Poole explained, involved sanding and cleaning the lead letters, applying a seal with acrylic preservative, and then carefully applying waterproof black paint with a small paintbrush.

The cemetery is the final resting place of five founding members of Council #485, including its first state deputy, John Poole (1866-1934); and its first chaplain, Father Matthew Wilkie (1843-1912). Poole, considered the father of the Knights of Columbus in Ontario, was also the first Canadian-born state deputy of what was then the jurisdiction of Canada and Newfoundland.

The other three council founders buried at St. James are Father O'Connell (1884-1933), a World War I military chaplain who was awarded at the Battle of the Somme and later helped to build the Order's Canadian Catholic Army that program; Michael J. Gorman (1856-1934), a prominent lawyer in Ottawa and the jurisdiction's first state deputy; and State Deputy Frank J. Carleton (1866-1938), a justice action who served in Ottawa and later served on the Supreme Court of Ontario. These three state deputies are buried there, as well as Thomas Brown (1874-1945).

Social Media

It has often been said that social media is where facts and neutrality go to die. But ignoring it is not the solution. Controlling the narrative on social media must remain at the forefront of our minds moving forward. So, it is with much pride that we have seen visits to our FB page increase from 2.1K followers to more than 2.2K followers. We have also doubled our social media post to almost one every calendar day. Likewise, we have 1,619 followers on "X" with more than 17K impressions (an increase of 70 per cent). Finally, on Instagram, we have 546 followers, and the number of visits has increased by 25 per cent.

District Deputies and Membership Information Officers:



The number of districts was reduced from 120 to 103 in our first fraternal year. This better reflected the reduction of 43 local councils. At the same time, for the first time in recent memory, every district in Ontario began the fraternal year with an appointed District Deputy. Each was welcomed by all State Board Officers and gifted a replica Rosary made of gunmetal symbolizing our bond with Canada's armed forces. Many councils have since purchased these rosaries to honor their clergy and deacons.

District Deputy attendance rose by 90 per cent, thanks to engaging keynote speakers and a completely revamped training program headed by a professional trainer. Likewise, the participation in the Ladies' Program doubled, thanks to Lady Zoye's ambitious concept of "Indulgence after Charity."

State Convention attendance also more than doubled, from 284 attendees in 2022 (Niagara Falls) to 650 in 2025 (Ottawa). To accommodate the growing attendance, we have to use two ball rooms at The Westin Ottawa hotel this year. Not to be outdone, the annual Squires Convention has seen its greatest attendance since 2020 with some 150 Squires, parents and guests attending their Convention in conjunction with our 2025 annual State Convention in Ottawa. This is the first time both conventions have been held at the same time, in the same place, since 1948. To mark this milestone, we will be exemplifying more than 15 Squires, who have turned 18, as regular members of the Knights at this State Convention.

Community Programs



Toys for Tots, Toy Mountain

Over the past two years we shifted the Knights persona into a real Catholic man with real programs making a real difference one Holy Moment at a time. Since then, thousands of Catholic men partnered with the Knights of Columbus in Ontario to make society a better place for their families to live more freely in a healthier and more prosperous Ontario.

What is even more exciting is that this enthusiasm has been seen at all levels of our Order. One example, among many,

is the Toy Mountain collection organized by Council #5135 in Waterloo which has seen an increase from 7,500 toys being collected and distributed in 2022 to 25,000 in 2024-2025.

Coats for Kids

Coats for Veterans

Our flagship charity program saw its donation of coats double in the past two years. This fraternal year alone, 18,696 coats were donated, representing almost 50 per cent of Canada's total with an estimated value of almost \$600,000.

The Coats for Veterans initiative, piloted in 2023-2024, was officially launched this year. Many councils are now partnering with Royal Canadian Legion branches to donate homeless veterans with warm winter coats during our cold winter months.

Global Wheelchair Program

In the 2023-2024 fraternal year, we donated 110 wheelchairs to Puerto Rico for the first time. The effort proved so successful that our brother Knights in Puerto Rico have started their own local wheelchair donation campaign and have asked our Wheelchair Chairman, Francisco Naar Chang, to mentor them. Building upon our lessons learned, we doubled the number of donations in my second term. This year, we donated 218 wheelchairs (estimated value of \$65,000).



As a result, we were able to double the number of trips under this administration (e.g. two trips instead of one) at no extra cost to the State Council. Since this program begun in 2006, Ontario has donated more than 3,600 wheelchairs.

Veterans' House Canada

We raised \$75,000 to fund the construction of a cenotaph at Veterans' House Canada in Ottawa—without passing any legacy debt to my successor.

Ultrasound Machines

Many of our community programs had a fundraising component. Raising funds for an ultrasound machine was a top priority. Much like every other major project under our Faith in Action pillars, we set an ambitious goal when it comes to supporting life: three new ultrasound machines, donated in Brampton, Hamilton, and a third one to be donated in Sudbury. This will bring Ontario's total to 50 per cent of all ultrasound machines donated in Canada.



Awards



In 2024, the Ontario government recognized our legacy of service. The Minister of Mental Health and Addictions, Hon. Michael Tibolo, a brother Knight, honoured us for our commitment to community service with a Certificate of Appreciation. We also received the City of Mayagüez Medal of Merit, Puerto Rico, from the city's Mayor in appreciation for our donation of wheelchairs to his city.

Membership

A critical look at the Québec + 1 Strategic Action Plan concerning Membership reveals many healthy and encouraging signs. Because of our increased presence through our programs, we achieved a rare milestone in our first year together. We achieved the title Circle of Honour, and we have every confidence that success in membership awaits us again at the end of this fraternal year. So far, this administration has seen membership grow by almost 4,500 members, or about eight per cent of all current members of the Knights of Columbus in Ontario.

New Councils are indicative of a healthy jurisdiction. In Ontario, for example, we established three of the three new Councils in the country so far this fraternal year. This success is predicated on a great membership team, including Brothers Vincent D'Souza, Dem Magmanlac, Rory Facca and Chris Dunn.

Online membership statistics remained the key marker of our new membership intake for 2024-2025. The importance of online membership cannot be understated. That being said, the conversion rate to regular membership has hovered around 50 per cent.

With deep appreciation for our roundtable chairman, Dan Pergolesi, we have also exceeded all expectations during the past two years. We went from 22 round tables between 2022-2023 to 32 in the 2023-2024 fraternal year and we expect this same number to continue, if not increase, by the end of this fraternal year. Even our Cor initiative saw a 66 per cent increase from one year ago thanks to our Cor Director and IPSD, Marcel Lemmen.

Webstore



During COVID-19 Supreme Council introduced a new KofC logo design complete with a new Blessed Fr. McGivney font. It would take 18 months for Ontario to transition to the new logo. In July 2023, all promotional items were ready for display and sale. This included lapel pins, keychains, baseball caps and toques, T-shirts and golf shirts, banners, lawn signs, and redesigning all letterhead. Also include in this revamped marketing plan was the KofC licence plate available


from the Ontario Ministry of transportation.

The baseball caps, and golf shirts were extremely popular with the membership. Sales of the 125th anniversary golf shirt, for example, saw an average of ten shirts sold every week for almost 18 consecutive months. Another

popular item was the first miniature jewel designed and offered in the jurisdiction of Ontario. It is available for purchase to any brother Knight



in good standing who is a member of the Knights 2024-2025 fraternal year. This jewel is only available for a limited time. In the past two years, sales from our webstore reached an unprecedented \$100,000.



Finally, I am proud to announce the release of my Volume One: Unofficial History of the Knights of Columbus in Ontario (1900-1962). This book, published on January 28, 2025—the 125th anniversary of Ontario's first charter—is the first comprehensive chronicle of our Order's provincial legacy.

Reflecting on my past ten years on the State Board, my heart swells with gratitude for our incredible journey together. When I arrived in 2015, you welcomed me with open arms. Your warmth, your kindness and unwavering support have been a source of strength and inspiration. We have laughed, cried, and prayed together. The following is my report:

Per Capita Charges and Collection

The first week of January each active council is sent their yearly State per capita invoice for all active members according to the council membership list we receive from Supreme on January 1st. As a reminder, it is the council's responsibility to move inactive members to the Affiliate list with Supreme. Our increase of 3% (based on the annual cost of living index) considers our planned yearly budget to operate the State Council.

As a reminder your 2025 State per capita must be received by June 30th as per Resolution 17 voted and approved by convention delegates at the 2024 State convention.

50/50 Raffle

This fraternal year, the State Board will continue to use Rafflebox (www.rafflebox.ca) to host our 50/50 raffles. Our first raffle for 2025 will take place this weekend (April 27th), our second raffle will take place on September 1st and our final draw for the year will take place on December 30, 2025.

State Bursary

Each year the State Council offers five student bursaries of \$1,000 each to first year full-time students attending an accredited college or university in Ontario. The deadline is June 1st so there is still time to participate. Applications are available on the State website on the link under community/bursary. Last year after receiving a record 32 applications the committee was able to pick the five winners. Henry Miller State Advocate



It has been a great joy, blessing and privilege to serve as Ontario State Advocate during our 125th anniversary year. No doubt, our brothers, in 1900, as now, were fascinated, as I am, by always learning and understanding more about the subtle intricacies of operating our order both at the local and provincial levels and appreciating the connections between the two. As Catholics, we have the advantage of over two thousand years of Church teaching to help guide us in this endeavour.



An important element of this teaching is Catholic Social Teaching rooted in, among other sources, Pope Leo XIII's masterful 1891 encyclical, *Rerum Novarum* ('of new things').

Part of this encyclical's genius is its profound understanding of the principles of solidarity and subsidiarity. Solidarity emphasizes the common good and safeguards the wider community, e.g. the church or the Knights of Columbus, as a whole. Subsidiarity safeguards the unique needs and internal life of local communities, e.g. parishes and councils. Both principles are key to the ongoing success of our order. It is your State Board who must always be mindful of and safeguard both principles. In turn, as State Advocate, it is my responsibility and privilege to support you in understanding and effectively using some essential tools, as elaborated below, that safeguard the integrity and good reputation of our order as whole, while allowing your councils to operate in and serve your parishes and local communities as effectively as possible.

Charter, Constitution and Laws (the "CC&L") of the Knights of Columbus

Generally updated annually after the Supreme Convention, the CC&L is the master set of rules for the good governance of our Order. In turn, the By-laws Online application, available on the Supreme website, supports our local councils in ensuring that they have their own sets of by-laws that are consistent with the CCL. In the CCL and council by-laws Roberts Rules of Order is specified as the parliamentary authority or set of meeting procedures that governs our order. Over the past year, it has been very interesting and personally fulfilling to assist both my State Board colleagues and local councils with understanding and applying the rules to the facts and circumstances at hand.

Safe Environment Program

Supreme's Safe Environment Program protects the most vulnerable members of our community, in particular, youth, by stipulating the order-wide requirements for both mandated training and background checks for specific positions at both the State and council level, including my own as State Advocate. Supreme has worked hard to focus and continuously improve the training and make the background checks process as simple and straightforward as possible. In assisting councils with understanding Safe Environment requirements, I am always grateful for the support I receive from the dedicated staff in Supreme's Office of Youth Protection.

Ontario Knights of Columbus Risk Management Protocol and Abuse, Discrimination, Harassment Prevention Policy (the “P&P”)

Consistent with the requirements of the Safe Environment Program, Ontario’s P&P addresses the unique needs of Ontario’s councils. It sets out the requirements for background checks for council members participating in programs involving youth, in addition to the background checks required for specific positions under the Safe Environment Program. It is mandatory that council members annually attest to their familiarity with the requirements of the P&P. Supported by David Gottlieb, Account Executive with our Ontario State liability insurance broker, Jones DesLauriers, we continue in striving to ensure that complying with P& P requirements is as straightforward as possible. Two successful innovations supporting this are the P&P slideshow and the one-page ‘traffic light’ guide to additional background check needs.

Liability Insurance

Councils must have liability insurance. Not having liability insurance could result in catastrophic consequences not only for councils but for individual council members. Councils may obtain liability insurance through brokers of their choice. In doing so, however, they must ensure they have proper and adequate coverage. Most Ontario councils obtain their liability insurance through Jones DesLauriers. David Gottlieb works with individual councils to determine the specific coverage and pricing that is best suited to them. As of February 2025 three-quarters of Ontario’s active councils have renewed their liability insurance with Jones DesLauriers. We expect that all active councils ensure that they have liability insurance in place.

Council Database Repository

Legal action can arise many years after the alleged matters concerned. Ontario State’s Council Database Repository was created to support successful council legal defence by providing for secure long-term storage of council liability insurance documents and other key information, e.g. attestation of council members’ familiarity with P&P requirements. The repository was designed and created through Councils’ consideration of a resolution concerning essential document retention repository at the 2022 Ontario State Convention, an excellent example of positive State and Council collaboration.

Resolutions

Safeguarding both solidarity and subsidiarity, resolutions are our means of ensuring that we best meet the evolving needs of our order and our councils and their parishes and communities. When, at our convention, we discuss and adopt resolutions, we have a powerful and practical way to inform and influence our order, e.g. through recommendations that, in turn, may be adopted through resolutions considered at the Supreme convention. We also have a powerful and practical means of influencing various other elements of society, through being attuned to both the local and broader societal concerns that inform the resolution crafting process.

I am immensely grateful for the assistance I have received from and the friendships I have made with so many people in fulfilling my responsibilities, including staff at all levels at Supreme and members of our Resolutions Committee. Friendship is one of the treasures of our order. In that vein, I thank my wonderful wife, Lynn, for all she does to support me as a Knight.

Veterans' House Canada, Ottawa





Immediate Past State Deputy



Welcome to the 2025 Ontario State Convention celebrating 125 years of the Knights of Columbus in our province. I hope you enjoy the weekend.

This is my second year as Immediate Past State Deputy and my last term as a member of the Ontario State Board. My journey on the board started in 2015 when I was elected State Advocate



and the past ten years have flown by. It has been a great pleasure travelling the province, meeting and aiding our members and their councils in all the Officer positions I have held over those years. My loving wife, Charlene, supported and accompanied me the entire time. I am very grateful to her and couldn't have done it without her. I am blessed with many treasured memories.

This Fraternal Year, in addition to Immediate Past State Deputy, I have also been serving as Director of Evangelization and Faith Formation, Director of New Council Development and maintaining the daily membership and reporting Leaderboard on the Ontario State website.

Evangelization and Faith Formation

The primary focus of the Evangelization and Faith Formation Directorship is the implementation of the *Cor* initiative in Ontario. Essentially, *Cor* is regularly scheduled men's groups that explore our faith in a social setting. The name *Cor* is Latin for Heart and is taken from St. John Henry Newman's episcopal motto "*Cor ad Cor Loquitur*" which means "Heart Speaks to Heart". *Cor* meetings consist of three elements: prayer, formation, and fraternity. *Cor* meetings are held separately from regular Council meetings, are conducted at least monthly, and should be open to all men of the parish. There is detailed information about *Cor* on the Supreme website: www.kofc.org/cor.

Cor has been enthusiastically received by our Councils in Ontario. Based on the annual report of our District Deputies, which is due every September, 66 Councils implemented *Cor* in their parish in the previous Fraternal Year and another 44 indicated that they would implement it this year. My correspondence with Councils indicates that that number has grown significantly over the past few months.



Last October I was honoured to be invited to present Cor to the Assembly of Catholic Bishops of Ontario (ACBO) at their Fall Plenary Session in Toronto. The presentation was well received and I had the opportunity to speak with many of the Bishops afterwards.

New Council Development

New Councils not only increase membership, but they also extend the reach of the Knights of Columbus into parishes that were not previously being served by us. Last Fraternal Year we achieved the quota set by Supreme and formed four new councils in Ontario: Council #18384 at St. Alphonsus in Toronto, Council #18496 at St. John the Baptist in Burlington, Council #18495 at Holy Trinity Croatian in Oakville, and Council #18397 at Sacred Heart in Paris.

Once again this Fraternal Year, the quota set by Supreme is four new councils in Ontario. As of the writing of this report, we have formed three so far: Council #18571 at St. Boniface in Scarborough, Council #18583 at St. Monica in Nepean, and Council #18671 at St. Michael the Archangel in Waterloo. I am confident that we will exceed our quota because there are several prospects in the pipeline: five are actively recruiting and another six are being investigated.

Supreme has raised the bar and now require thirty members to start a new council, rather than twenty. Supreme feels that more charter members are required to ensure that a new council is successful. These members can be either new recruits or transfers. It is primarily the responsibility of the District Deputy to form a new council, and I have been promoting New Council Development to them at the District Deputy meetings.

Our workshops underwent a complete overhaul to encourage more participation and engagement. Even the ladies program, under lady Zoye, underwent a significant review. The result was a 90 per cent increase in the number of DD's participating in the workshops and the ladies saw 100 per cent increase in participation.



Innovations included a DD workbook, practical leadership exercises, feedback surveys, and a 90 per cent reduction in the use of PowerPoint presentations and "Death by slides." Presenters were kept to their allotted times and all presentations were vetted prior to them being distributed for consistency of messaging and promoting our State Deputy's Québec+1 Strategic Action Plan. More specifically these sessions covered:

- Understanding and implementing faith in action
- Strategies for council growth
- Membership development and retention

- Administrative and financial responsibilities of District Deputies
- Effective communication and conflict resolution

Recognizing the importance of continuous learning and open communication, we have also introduced ongoing virtual leadership training opportunities. These sessions provide a platform for our provincial leaders to connect, share best practices, and seek guidance directly from the Faith in Action Program Director. This initiative ensured that district deputies and council leaders have ongoing support and the necessary resources to implement successful programs at the local level.

My term as your Program Director will end in June so I wish to extend my heartfelt gratitude to all of our District Deputies, Grand Knights, Program Directors, and Council leaders who have worked tirelessly to serve their communities, advance the mission of the Knights of Columbus in Ontario and support of our State Deputy's vision.

Conversion of Our Online Members

While registering online is a relatively new phenomenon with the Knights of Columbus, which began in 2018, it has become the largest component of our new members. Averaging 75 per cent of all new members, the Québec+1 Strategic Action Plan needed to address this reality and seek out new ways to convert online members into regular members in subordinate councils.

To that end an additional member was added to the team. While Rorry Facca was the Online Chairman, he was helped by Chris Dunn as our new Online conversion coordinator. In the past two consecutive years our online conversion went from roughly 26 per cent on June 30, 2023, to 50 per cent by March 2025 – almost double!


Spiritual Reflections

Families are - and ought to be more - engaged in various (if not all) Service Programs. This perspective is relevant to our theme of "Our Father is Welcoming and this is our Homecoming."



Homecoming is associated with moments of connection and joy; Family Homecoming usually has components of shared meals and lasting memories. Our upcoming 125th anniversary presents a unique opportunity for a large Ontario families homecoming.

On an-ongoing basis, Families Homecoming occurs at the following Family Programs:

- Thanksgiving – Food for Families programs (collecting items and donating to Food Banks).
- Keep Christ in Christmas activities – poster competitions, nativity scenes.
- Family Week
- Family Fully Alive

"The Father is Welcoming" brings images of the return of the prodigal son to his family. This image relates to the following Family Programs:

- Family prayer
- Good Friday promotion
- Family of the Month / Family of the Year.

During 2024-25, we have seen a significant increase in the participation of Councils in various programs (more than 30% in some cases). This increase in participation is the result of a team effort (with Chairmen, District Deputies, State Office) and a concerted effort in communications (numerous articles, presentations at District Deputy meetings and one-to-one sessions). I remain optimistic that, with proper support, this trend can and should continue.

Last fraternal year we distributed some 110 wheelchairs to Puerto Rico. For the first time in our history, our fundraising efforts were so good that we were able to make a second donation of wheelchairs in as many years. Since this was neither expected nor budgeted, our State Deputy and our Global Wheelchair Chairman Francisco Naar Chang paid their own way to Panama where some 218 wheelchairs were donated on behalf of the Knights of Ontario.

What is perhaps less well known about our wheelchair program is our donation of wheelchairs in Ontario. In August 2024, for example, our State Deputy was



A few weeks later, after he had received his wheelchair, Peter joined the Knights of Columbus. He was exemplified in January 2025 and claims to enjoy attending local Council meetings!

Flagship Program - Coats for Kids

Echoing part of the State Deputy's report, we not only met our goal of 10,000 coats (established in 2008) we doubled the number of coats donated in the two past fraternal years. We went from 8,784 coats in 2022-2023 to almost 18,696 coats in 2024-2025.

Basketball Free Throw



Brother Anthony Viresi, our Ontario State Basketball, hockey and soccer Chairman has done yeoman work with respect to our children programs. But his work with Basketball Free Throw has been truly exceptional. Almost one hundred councils took part in this year's competition.

Under the leadership of Sir Knight (SK) Dan Pergolesi as Chairman of the annual Movember campaign in November 2024, and with the assistance of past Chairmen, SKs Henry Miller and David Fisher, our participation has seen remarkable growth. The number of brother Knights involved surged from 12 in 2022 to over 60 participants during the combined 2023 and 2024 campaigns. This increased engagement led to a significant rise in donations, escalating from approximately \$5,000 in 2022 to over \$30,000 over 2023 & 2024. Congratulations to SK Dan Pergolesi and all participants for their dedication and success in this vital men's health initiative.

Our theme: "Our Father is welcoming, and this is our Homecoming" has a special meaning for me. I have registered to become a deacon, so this will be my last year as a director.



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

On March 15, 2008, Pope Benedict XVI declared him venerable, and, on October 31, 2020, the Venerable Michael J. McGivney was beatified.

Blessed McGivney's ability to intercede in our daily lives has been recognized at the only Honoris in Canada located at the Spiritual home of the Knights of Columbus in Ontario at St. Patrick Basilica. Here, a "Request for favours box" has been installed. This is a very private and confidential part of The Honoris, but it is made available to the faithful who may wish to send a request for favours. You may send a request by mail or via email which will then be printed and placed in the box.


Christian Refugee Relief Holy Land and Persecuted Christians



In the last fraternal year, the members of the Knights of Columbus in Ontario raised \$450K for Christian Refugee Relief for a total of \$1.23M in the two years of this Administration. What better way to ponder this year's theme "Our Father is Welcoming and This is Our Homecoming" than to celebrate the innovative restructuring that was adopted almost two years ago and reflect upon the successes of our programs in the Holy Land.



Initiatives



Following the launch of www.christianrefugeerelief.org, Deputy Supreme Knight Arthur Peters and Archdiocese of Toronto generous donors provided significant support. Key initiatives included supporting the Christian villages in the Melkite Catholic Diocese of Tyre with food, medicine, healthcare and aiding Catholic education for St. Sauveur School of the Salvatorian Basilian Order with student scholarships, computer lab, student transportation and mitigate the main school's annual deficit.

The Melkite Catholic Patriarchate school in Beit Sahour near Bethlehem was also supported by the award winning successful www.jerusalemstudents.org project \$45,000 in educational scholarships as well as \$50,000 for establishing a Patriarchate Nursery thanks to a generous Toronto Archdiocese donor.

Compassionate Care for Orphans

We founded www.orphansforjesus.org to continue the message of our founder and support orphanages from Ukraine, Lebanon, the Holy Land, to Syria and will eventually grow to orphanages all over the world. Hikmat has made new transfers each to the joint Caritas Knights of Columbus orphanage in Poland, to The Holy Family Children's Home, known as Bethlehem Creche, in the Holy Land, and to other orphanages.





The remarkable efforts of the Ontario Knights of Columbus Christian Refugee Relief have created hope because we have helped. Each contribution for initiatives like Diocese of Tyre, Jerusalem Students, Orphans for Jesus helps those in dire need, supporting orphans and fulfilling the will of our Lord and the wish of Blessed Michael J. McGivney. It is only through these acts of charity, sometimes called Holy Moments, that we can change the world!

In closing, I have had the pleasure of working with our outgoing State Deputy. I saw him before and after his heart attack and incredible recovery followed by his commitment to the Order in Ontario. Our new flagship program, Coats for Kids, morphed to include coats for Veterans. Moreover, donations of coats more than doubled under this administration in the past two years from some 8,784 coats in 2022-2023 to almost 18,696 coats in 2024-2025.

Anna Kocmarek excelled as the lead for our Coats for Kids program and her efforts will be sorely missed at the provincial level moving forward.



Finally, we created booklets for all events as a means of selling advertising space and to encourage sponsorships. This workload became very taxing and required new innovative approaches to the management of the Hamilton State Office - including the hiring of one new employee in February 2024 just to keep up with our State Deputy (a.k.a. "Busy Bruce").

As my contract draws to a close in May, I remain steadfast in my appreciation for all the support and guidance I received from my team at the Hamilton State Office: Liane, Ani, Godwill, and Anna. They provided excellent support and guidance to our State Board officers, directors, chairmen and subordinate council members and I am proud to have worked alongside each and everyone of them. Likewise, I speak on behalf of all staff members at the Hamilton State Office when I say thank you to our Knights of Columbus "customers" and wish everyone a very successful 125th anniversary - including my new replacement.



After 50 Years, Annual State Convention Returns To Ottawa

Hundreds of delegates from across the province convened in Ottawa from April 25 and 27, 2025 for the 122nd annual State Convention of the Knights of Columbus in Ontario. Highlights of the extensive program included:

CENOTAPH UNVEILING

Even before the jam-packed two-days of business and fellowship began, delegates, their ladies and guests arrived on April 24, 2025, for a special unveiling ceremony at Veterans' House Canada in Ottawa. The cenotaph—conceived, designed, funded and constructed by the Knights of Columbus—is only the third monument sponsored by the Order in Ontario.



The first was the Carhagouha Cross in Midland (1922); followed by the Pray for Peacemonument in Windsor (1967). Now, this new cenotaph honours our Veteran Community—both serving and retired—in the nation's capital.

The project was fully funded by February 2025 through donations. The unveiling ceremony also included a proclamation from the Mayor of Ottawa, declaring April 20-26 as Knights of Columbus Week.

Ottawa was chosen to host this convention—the first since 1974—in recognition of its historic significance as the birthplace of the Order in Ontario. Pioneer Council #485, established in Ottawa on January 28, 1900, also had the largest contingent of members in attendance at the convention.

MEMORIAL MASS & HOLY HOUR

Friday, the official opening day, included committee meetings, a Memorial Mass, and a Holy Hour—both of which were filmed by a crew hired by the Supreme Council. The adoration chapel at the convention featured three first-class relics: St. Jean de Brébeuf, St. Kateri Tekakwitha, and Blessed Carlo Acutis, who is soon to be canonized.

As a sign of mourning for the late Pope Francis, members were encouraged to wear purple ribbons on their labels and golf shirts. This sign of respect will continue until May 25, 2025.

OPENING CEREMONY AND AWARDS

The Opening Ceremony was held Friday evening at the Westin Ottawa hotel. Supreme Knight Patrick E. Kelley offered introductory remarks, followed by a year-in-review address by our State Deputy. Awards were then presented across multiple categories including Basketball Free Throw Championship, Soccer Challenge, Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest, Catholic Citizenship Essay Contest, Canadian Wheelchair Foundation Award, Trillium Awards, Council Bulletin Awards, Raffle Awards, Membership Awards, and Faith in Action Awards.

BUSINESS SESSION

Registration indicated 247 voting delegates, representing 492 councils and 56,443 members. They were joined by 80 observers and guests. Delegates heard reports from State Board officers and directors before voting to elect the 2025-2026 State Board. Brother Donny Thivierge of Council #12494 (Windsor) was elected as the new State Warden.



In the afternoon, the business session resumed with discussion of 24 resolutions. Delegates approved an increase of \$5 to the State per capita fee, effective in the 2026 calendar year. Another approved resolution allowed a portion of the Christopher Fund to be invested in a Canadian financial institution rather than an American one.

SATURDAY MASS

The Saturday Mass was celebrated by the State Chaplain at Notre Dame Cathedral Basilica, located near the convention hotel. The Mass featured a procession of 46 Sir Knights, four bishops, and 12 concelebrating priests. Nearly 1,000 people were in attendance.

STATE BANQUET DINNER

No convention is complete without the formal State Banquet Dinner. This year's dinner, held on Saturday evening, was one of the largest in more than 50 years, with 670 delegates, spouses, and guests in attendance.

The banquet featured 125th-anniversary-themed centerpieces with fairy lights, commemorative regional song booklets, and printed programs. Each guest received a complimentary bottle of wine donated by the State Deputy to mark the Order's 125th anniversary in Ontario.

The State Deputy also presented major awards including:

- Best Council Award – Council #7969 (Stoney Creek)
- Family of the Year Award – Brother Paul Martin and wife Cindy (Council #6361, Bowmanville)
- Ontario Field Agent of the Year – Jean-Pierre Ricard (Eastern Ontario)
- State Deputy Awards – Brothers David Fisher, Gerard Gonsalves, & Narciso Rodrigues

The keynote speaker was Abby Johnson, bestselling author and subject of the pro-life film *Unplanned*.

Thanks to her inspirational presence, more than \$30,000 was raised for the Knights of Columbus Ultrasound Initiative. With matching funds from the Supreme Council, another ultrasound machine will soon be donated. To close the evening, the State Deputy and Supreme Director from North Carolina, Colin Jorsch, performed a spirited duet of Neil Diamond’s *Sweet Caroline* to the crowd’s delight.



LADIES’ PROGRAM

A special program for the delegates’ wives included a decorative door ornament workshop, luncheon, and a shopping trip to the Rideau Centre.

SQUIRES CONVENTION

Reviving a tradition that began in 1948, the Columbian Squires held their annual convention concurrently and on-site. Approximately 150 Squires, area chairman, and family members attended the centennial event, which included the exemplification of 14 Squires into full Knighthood.

HOCKEY GAME

The convention concluded as it began—with a memorable public event. More than 400 spectators attended the first-ever hockey game between the Knights of Columbus Ontario State Council and the Flying Fathers on Sunday afternoon at the Jim Durrel Recreation Centre. The event raised more than \$5,000 for Special Olympics.



FINANCIAL OUTCOME AND LOOKING AHEAD

Following the convention, the Westin Ottawa hotel manager informed the Executive Secretary that the Knights would receive a refund of approximately \$30,000. This marked significant progress in the financial management of the State Convention. By contrast, the Knights were fined \$42,000 in 2022 in Niagara Falls because of unfulfilled contractual obligations (rooms rented and meal orders). The following two years saw a break-even result, and this year saw a surplus!

Sudbury Area Councils Raises Funds with a Cash Calendar

The Maison Inner-City Home de/of Sudbury provides emergency food bank services to approximately 1,200 households a month throughout Greater Sudbury; it also offers life skills programs and support for clients and their families; it has long been supported by local Councils.

Thirteen Sudbury area Councils, from the English and French Districts, decided to support Maison Inner-City Home with a 2025 cash calendar (daily prizes). Since 2025, is the 125th anniversary of the Knights in Ontario, with the support and help of Council #485 in Ottawa, the calendar was also designed to both celebrate and be a souvenir of the anniversary. This has truly been a community project, with the calendar designed and printed in Sudbury, local sponsors, and primarily local sales.

The cash calendar, with a prize board of \$21,750, has been overwhelmingly supported by the community in terms of sponsorships and sales (sold out 4,500 copies). The calendar is fully bilingual; per the communities we serve. When completed, the project will yield a donation to Maison Inner-City Home of more than \$60,000.

This project brought 14 councils together in unity, fraternity and charity, and provided the opportunity for many knights to get to know and work with members of other councils. It is an excellent example of putting our faith into action, a project for the community, that impacts families in thier time of need.
